Lee, he said, turned down many lucrative offers after the war in order to devote himself to a cause he believed in heartily—that of building the small Washington College into a great University.

The national sorority members continued the four-day convention today with a trip this afternoon over the Blue Ridge to Natural Bridge and over the Blue Ridge Parkway to Lexington. A Memorial Service will be held at Washington and Lee Chapel.

Present for the anniversary celebration will be four of the sorority's founders, national chairmen and officers, delegates from 40 collegiate chapters and from 29 alumnae chapters.

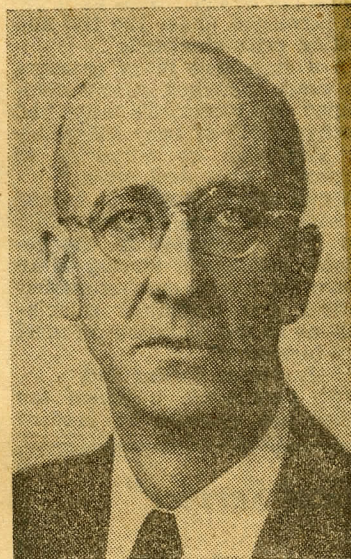
The opening session of the convention is scheduled for 2 p.m. Tuesday. Final business session, presentation of awards and the closing banquet will take place Friday afternoon and night.

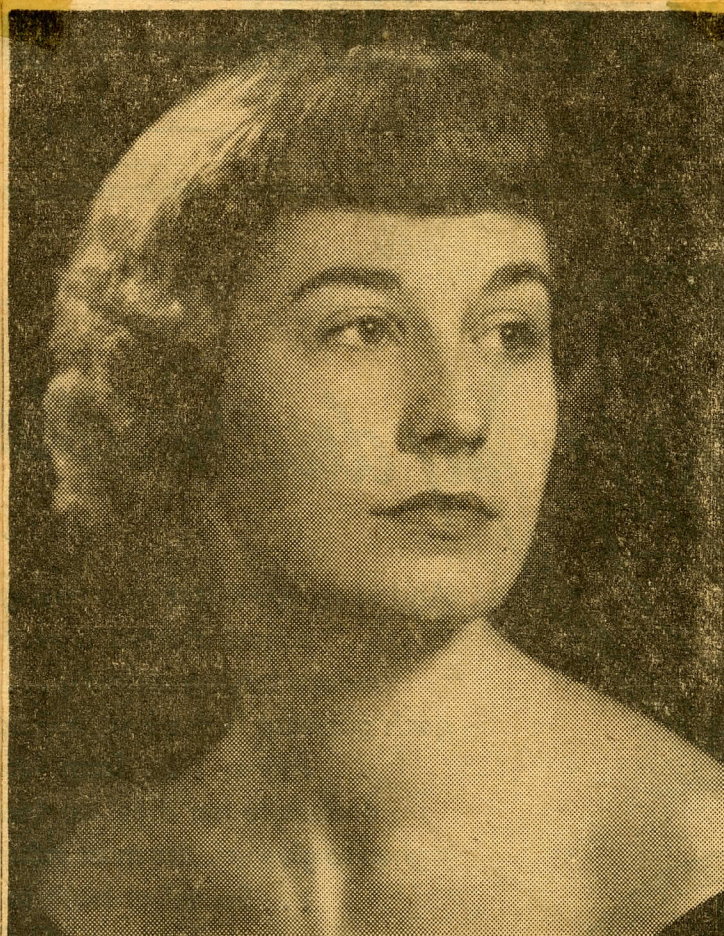

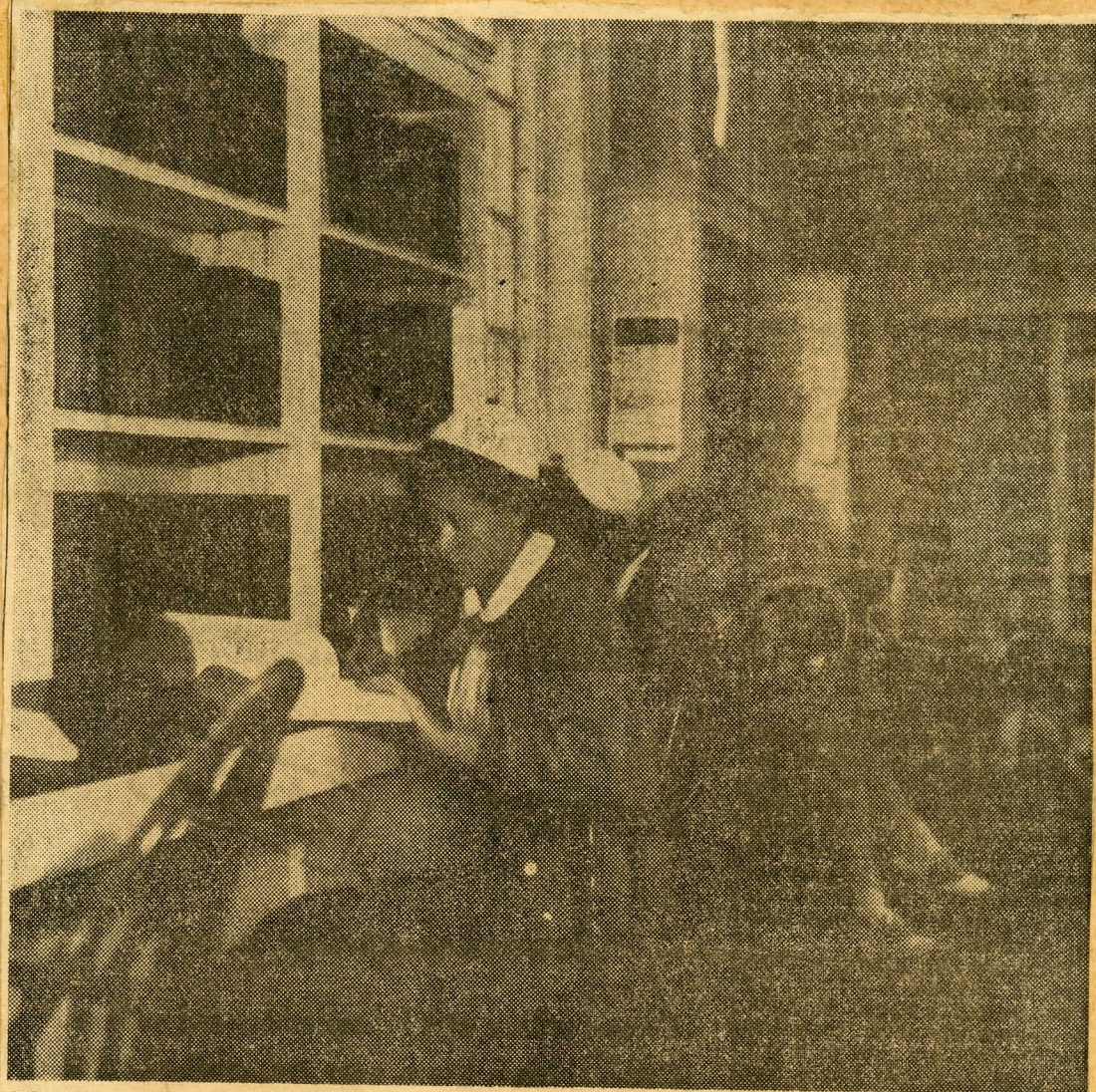

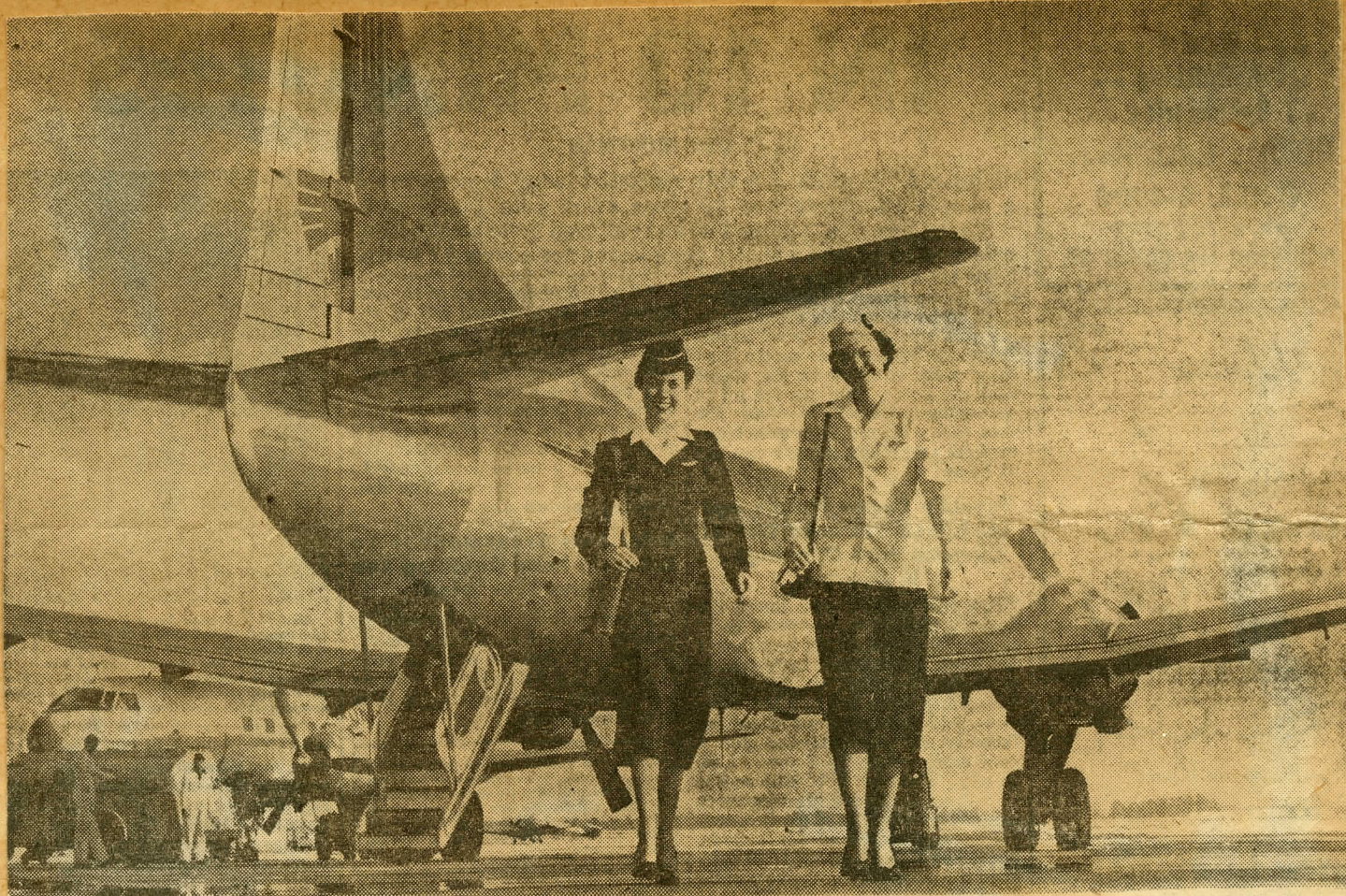
