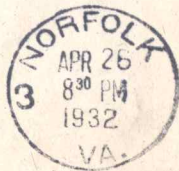
## PAN-HELLENIC OFFICERS FILL IN VACANCIES

## May Pole of Merry Mount Is Colorful May Day Theme

Favored with ideal weather conditions the annual May Day fete at Farmville State Teachers College proved to be one of the most colorful and finished performances in recent years.

At five o'clock Saturday, May 4, the celebration in the natural amphitheatre at Longwood began and for forty-five minutes an audience of approximately one thousand watched a cast of two hundred college students in their interpretation of Hawthorne's "The May Pole of Merry Mount." The steadiness of the Puritans, the jolliness of the merrymakers, the stealthiness of the Indians, the oddities of the masked dancers and the beauty of it all radiated the quaintness of the story and the beauty of the day.

Tickets will be given only to the graduates and their families.



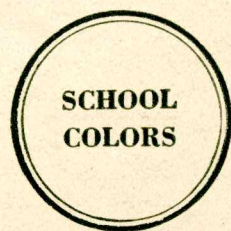
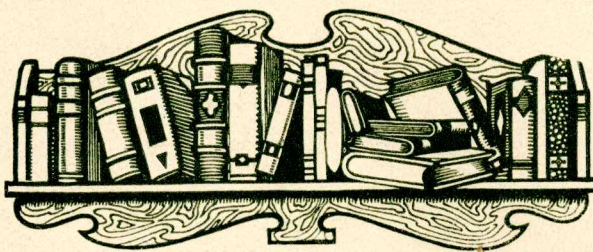




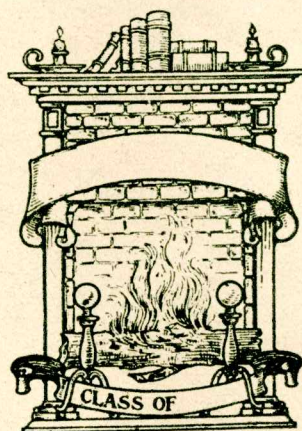
