Tentative plans discussed in the meeting include an informal tea for all elementary majors. A Christmas party for the rural school children in this vicinity is another activity planned by the organization.

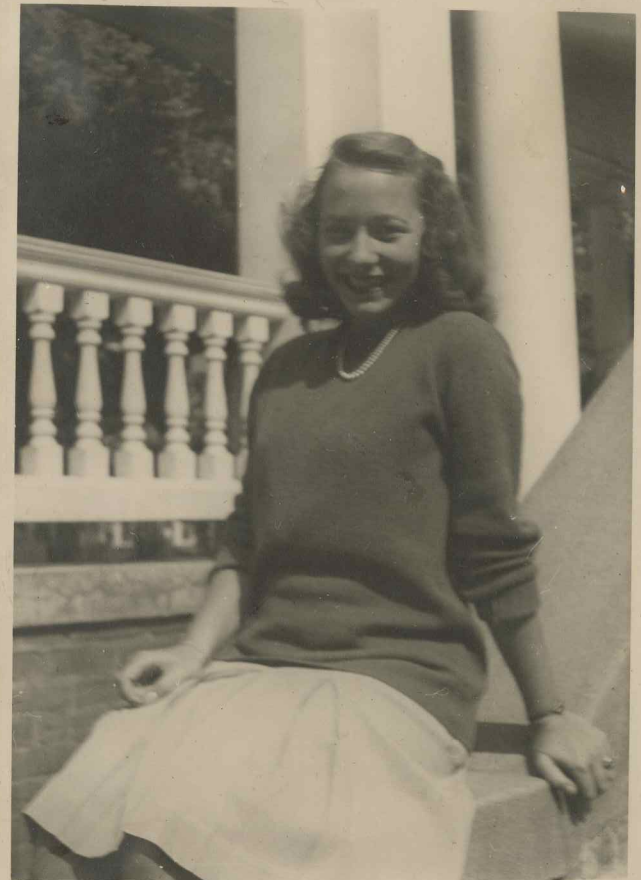

The two junior representatives on the court will be Frances Lee, Richmond, and Jacquelin Parden, Norfolk.

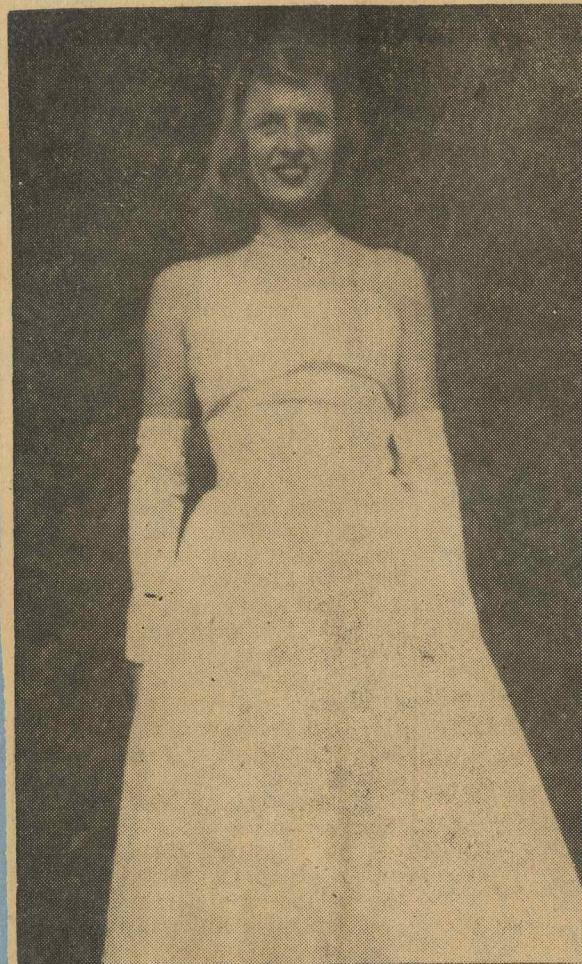

Ellett Announces December 7 As Date For Senior Dance

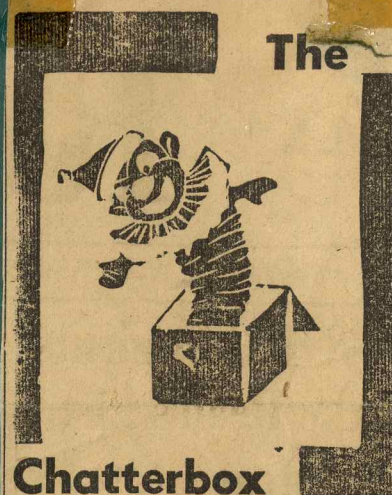
December 7, as announced by Margaret Ellett, president of the senior class, marks the date of the annual class dance, one of the biggest affairs of the year.

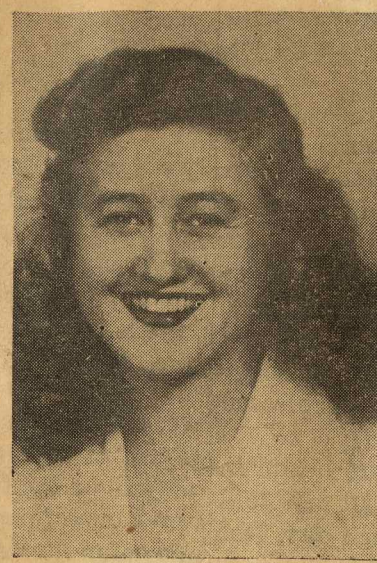

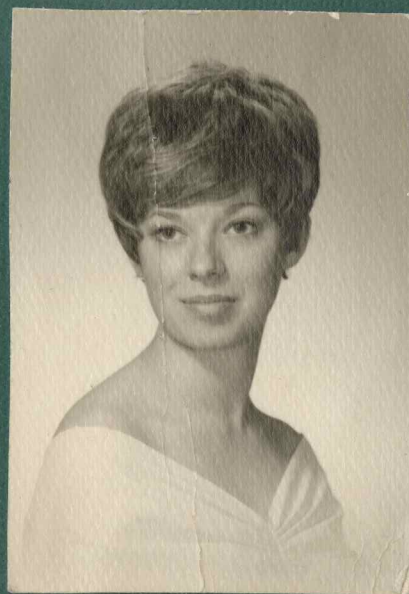
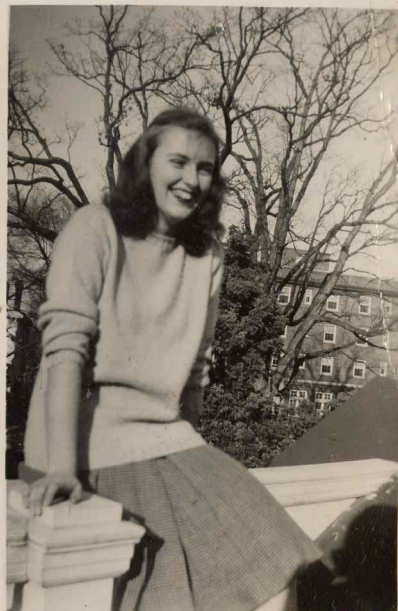
Sophomores Hold Rat Court Tonight

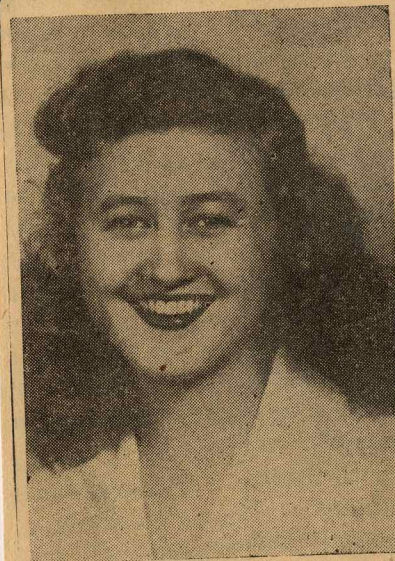

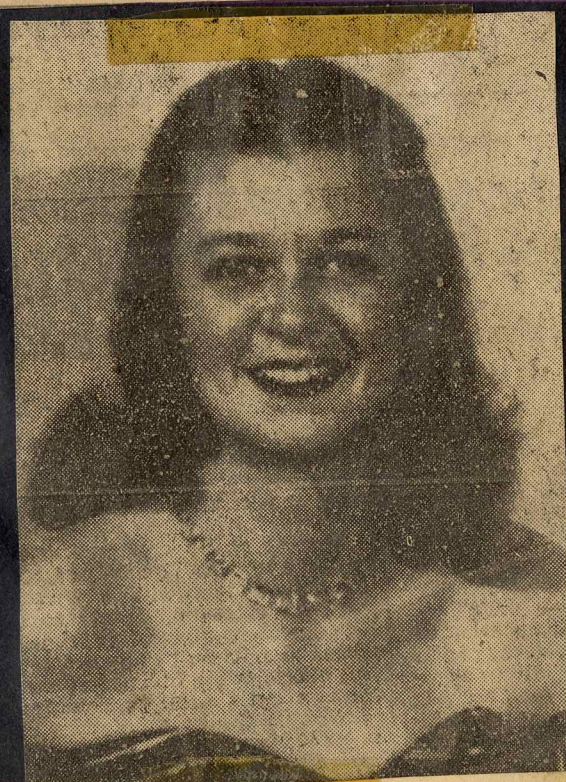

Being librarian of one of Virginia's best rural elementary school libraries is a challenge to Mrs. Georgia Wealch.

Her bright, sun-in library in Cumberland's John Randolph school is the pin-point of lavish attention flowing from college campuses and Tri-Sigma sorority alumnae chapters across the U.S.

But Mrs. Wealch, who came here from Ann Arbor, Mich., back in 1945 to be just a "plain teacher" and then found herself librarian of a "far-above-the-average" library, is equal to the task.

She has to divide her time with her seventh grade teaching work, but after school and Saturday hours can make up for that in maintaining the library in keeping with its tradition as a nationwide project of Sigma, Sigma, Sigma.

Works Toward Degree

So interesting and challenging has she found the work that she's devoting her summers to working toward a degree in library science.

Such things take time, especially when you add the responsibility and rearing of two children. She has a son, Donald, in the sixth grade at John Randolph and a daughter, Mary Kay, at Cumberland High School.

It is good that the school system has found someone to look after the library with such interest. Tri-Sigma's attention has endowed it with facilities far exceeding those ordinarily found in a school of 285 pupils, eight teachers and a principal.

It was back in 1932 that the sorority took the library under its wing as a national project, with each college chapter and each alumnae chapter contributing books, magazines and other facilities each year.

8,000 Volumes

The first year, 250 books were donated. Since then, the number has increased to over 8,000 volumes. Each day two daily newspapers go on the shelves, and a Sunday issue of the New York Times is added on Monday.

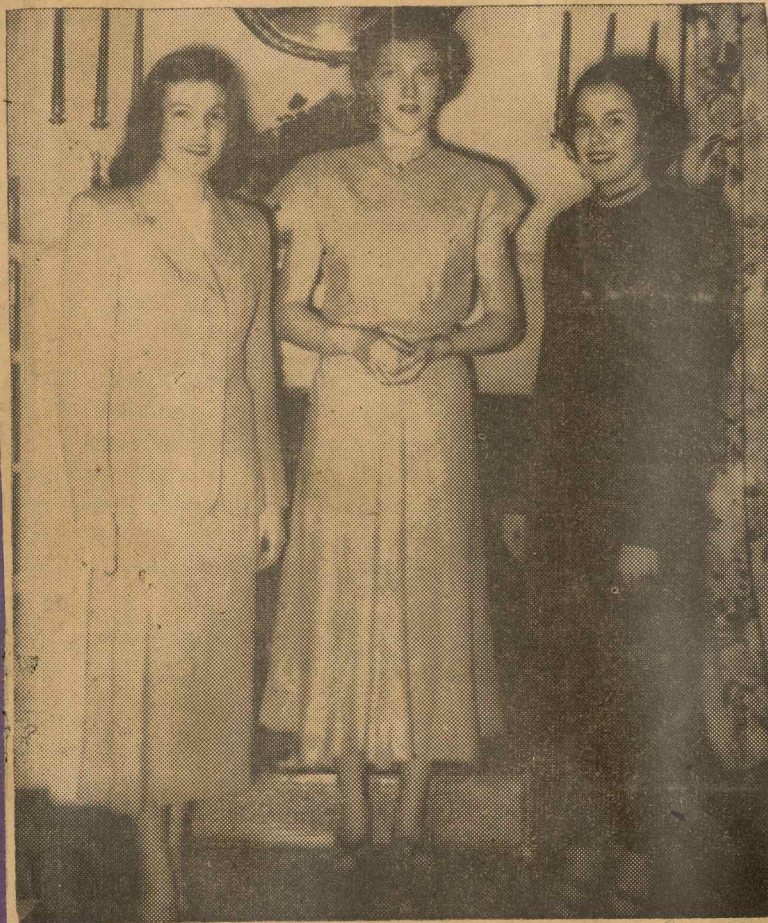

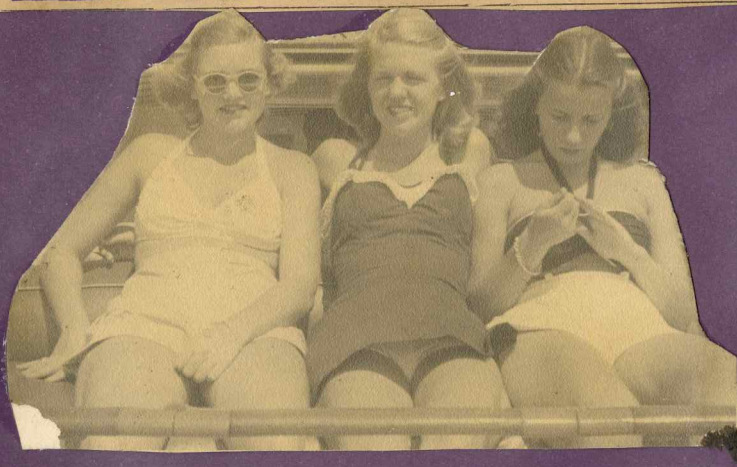

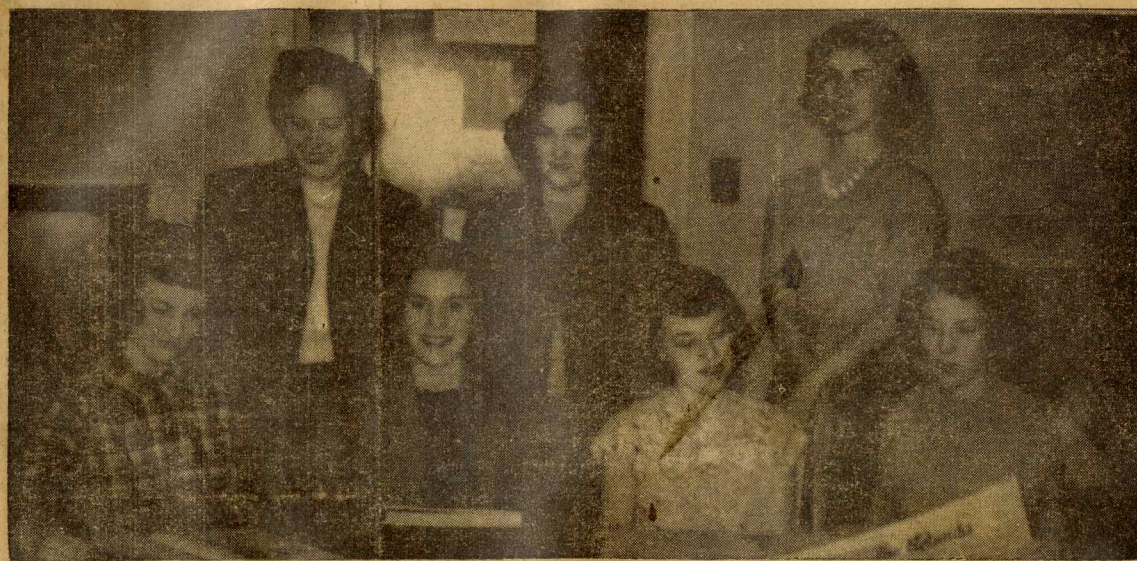
Ritter High Scorer

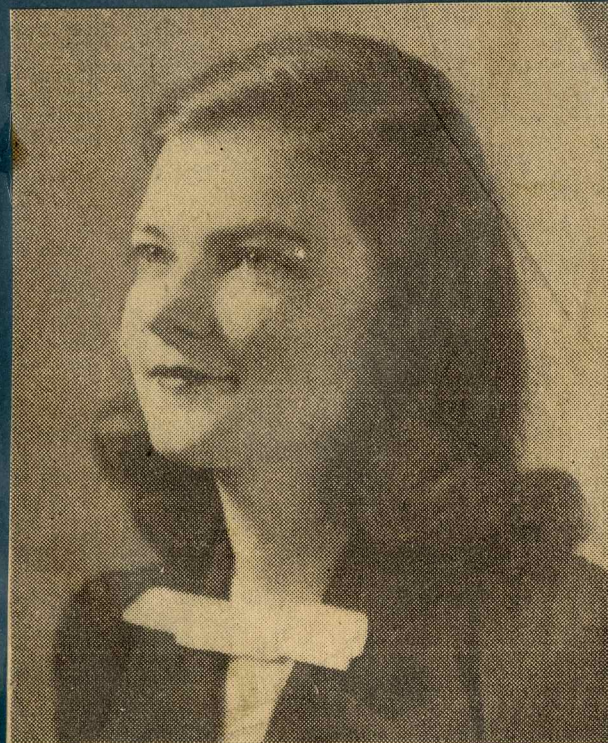
Wide Background

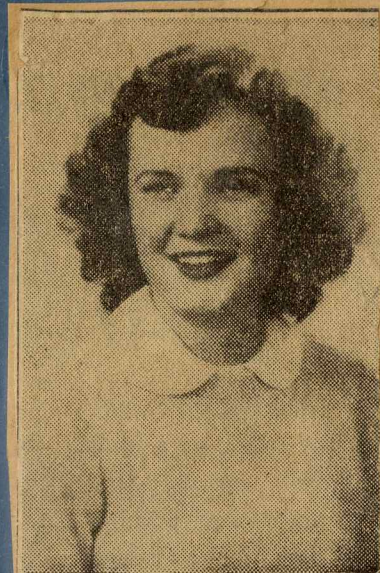

Farmville College Dorm Is Leveled By Morning Fire

Falling Roof Injures Three Persons; No Students Hurt in \$300,000 Blaze

By Maurice Dean

FARMVILLE, March 6 — Fire roared through the combination auditorium and dormitory building at Farmville State Teachers College here early this morning and threatened to spread to other school buildings before it was subdued three hours later by the combined effort of firefighters from five communities.

The large three-story brick building, which was built in 1905, collapsed at the height of the spectacular blaze and was only a pile of smoking rubble tonight.

Dr. Dabney S. Lancaster, president of the college, estimated the damage to be in excess of \$300,000.

So quickly did the blaze spread through the ivy-covered structure that 60 girl occupants of the dormitory section lost all their personal belongings.

All girls in the building at the time the fire started—shortly after 6 A. M.—fled to safety in their nightclothes, but three persons fighting the blaze were injured slightly when the roof of the structure collapsed, bringing down the side walls with it.

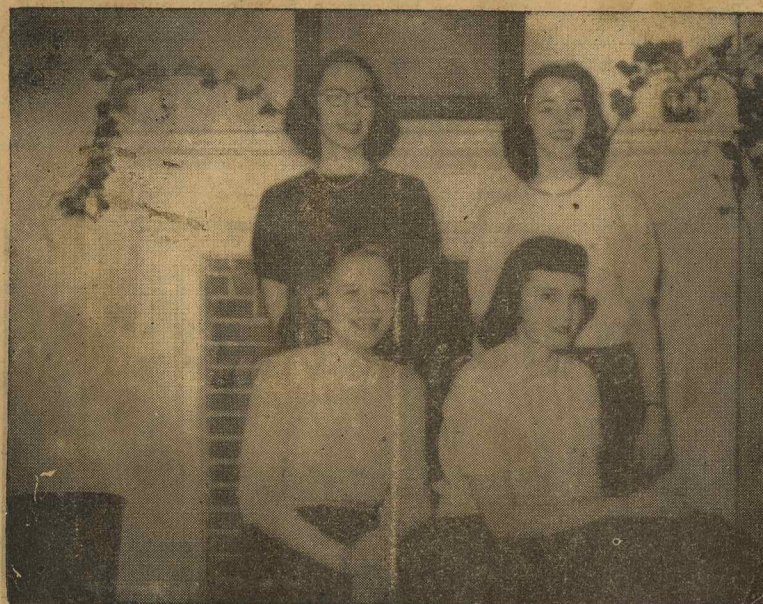

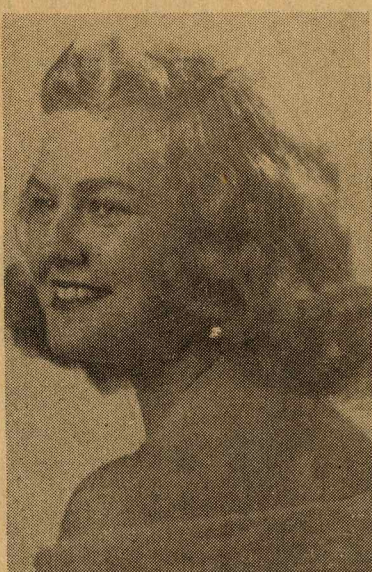

Farmville Fire Ruined Student Play Costumes

FARMVILLE, March 8.—Theatrical costumes and campus togs, it developed today, were lost in the \$300,000 fire which destroyed a dormitory-auditorium at Farmville State Teachers' College Sunday.

About \$2,000 worth of costumes, left the college by a wartime Federal agency, were being sorted in the auditorium for a forthcoming production of "Lady Windemere's Fan," a Victorian drama.

Of this lot, Dr. Dabney S. Lancaster, college president, said today, about \$1,000 worth was burned. Total estimated damage in the destruction of the building was \$300,000.

CAST HANDICAPPED

As a result, Dr. Lancaster said, costuming will be handicapped.

"A very few" other costumes had been borrowed, and restitution will be made, if it is found that these were damaged, he said.

The play, postponed for several weeks, is not the only campus function delayed by the fire.

The annual celebration of "Founders' Day," planned for next Saturday, will be held instead on June 4, during the commencement period. If weather permits, the observance will be staged at "Longwood." Otherwise, the program may be presented in one of the churches here.

AID PLANNED

Farmville citizens turned out at a mass meeting last night to aid the girls who lost their personal property in the fire.

A group of 300 citizens met in the Farmville courthouse and pledged \$4,110 plus \$600 in blankets to be contributed by the local chapter of the American Red Cross.

The meeting raised \$1,156 in cash and \$2,954 was pledged.

PRICES REDUCED

The Retail Merchants' committee of the Farmville Chamber of Commerce stated that a 30 per cent reduction would be made to all of the girls refurnishing their wardrobe in Farmville.

Heading the committee for raising funds for the girls was Mayor W. C. Fitzpatrick. He was assisted by Maurice Large, treasurer, and Mrs. Frank R. Crawford, committee secretary.

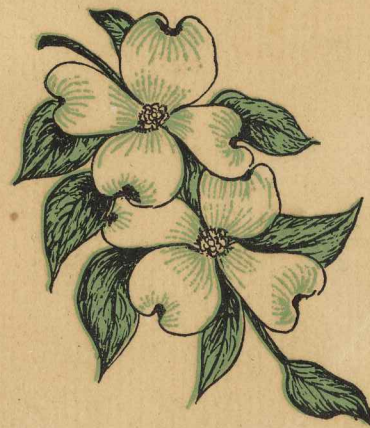

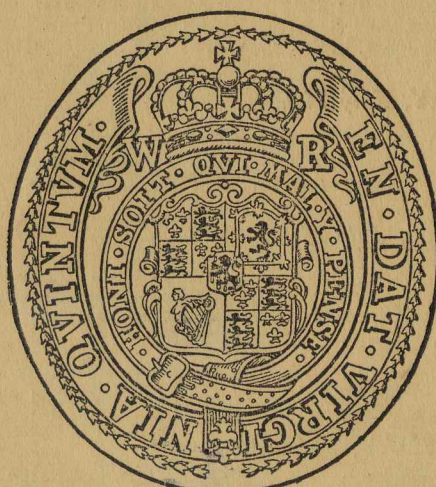
