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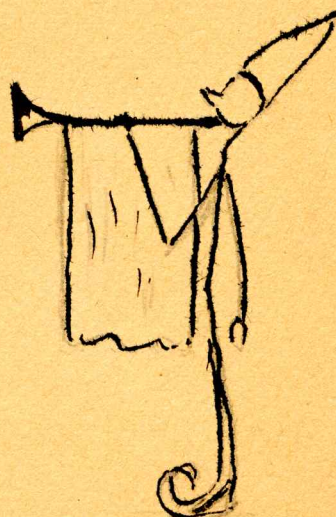

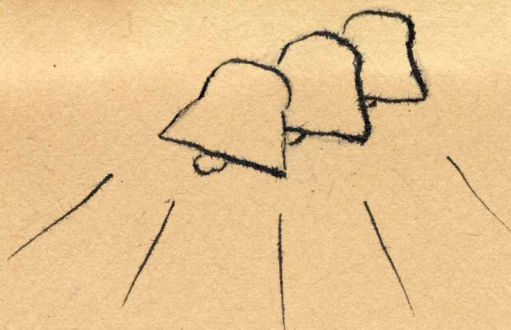
## Miss Baker, Mr. Crawley Are Betrothed

Students Standards Committee, headed by Martha Whelchel, has announced its plans to put into effect during the 1940-41 session.

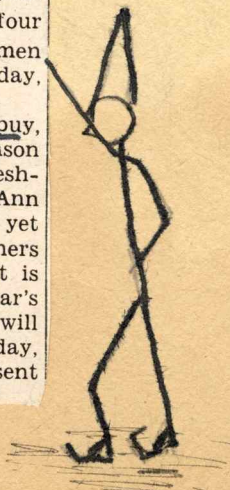
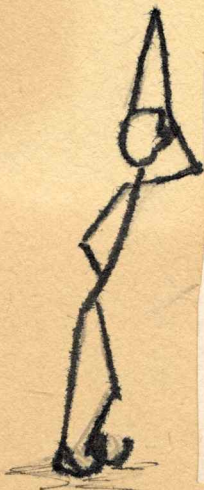

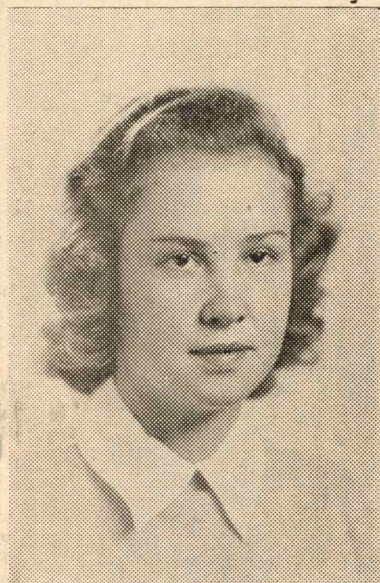
Her interest and enthusiasm have caused her to contribute to nearly every activity on campus. Her side-splitting wit is surpassed only by her dependability.

## House Council Rules For Week of Exams

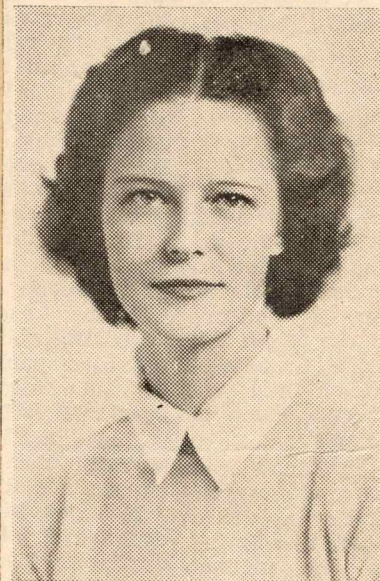
Marjorie Nimmo, president of the House Council has announced the following rules to be observed during exams:

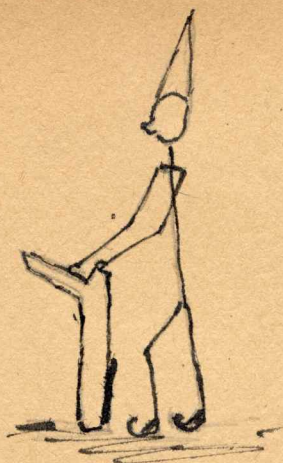


## Miss Mix Expected Here Next Week

### Qualities of Work With Children Is Teachers Heritage

"You have a most beautiful heritage—the legacy of understanding, sacrifice, tenderness and patience left you by those who have loved and worked for and with little children," stressed Miss Grace E. Mix when she addressed the members of the Association of Childhood Education gathered in the College Tea Room for their annual banquet Monday night, March 18.

"Down through the ages the love of little children has been a characteristic of greatness in men and women. Jesus, the Great Teacher, had a tenderness for children that none other surpassed. Gradually was an understanding for children developed. Plato respected child's play. It was left, however, for Rousseau and Ferbee to see that play had a real meaning to children in developing opportunity in meeting a real need for self-expression. Play thus came to be considered as a vital means of learning.

"There have been stages in the development of ideas toward children. A study of literature in times past will reveal periods when the child was considered as a little adult. Children were taught to think of their sins and penitence and dying, the emphasis always being on the serious side of life.

"Ferbel who is considered the founder of the kindergarten contributed perhaps the most toward

the now prevalent idea of young childhood. He emphasized play as a means of education in both the home and social relationships.

"The kindergarten, with the love of little children as its ideal, organized itself into the Association for Childhood Education. Thus are primary teachers affiliated with the strongest of organizations for the betterment of childhood."

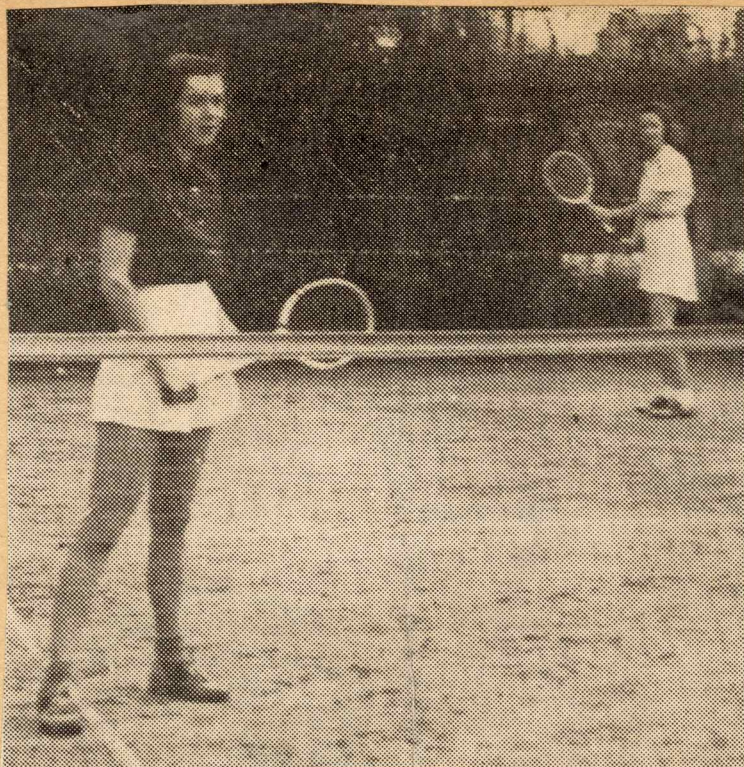
## Swim Team Gains Honor in NIT Meet

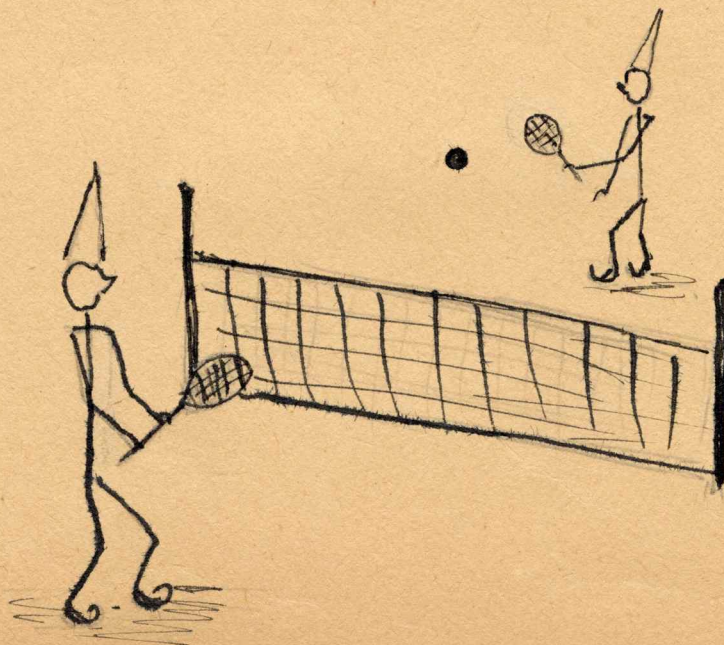

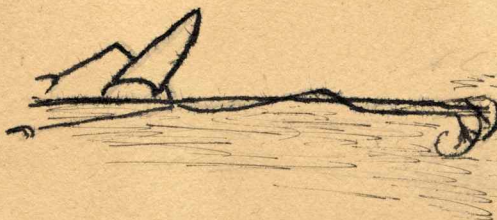

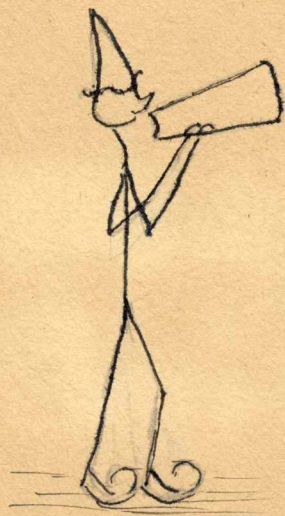

## Junior-Senior Prom Held Saturday in Gym

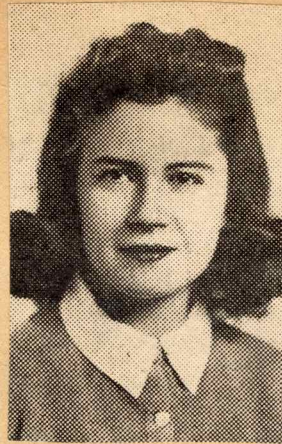
The seniors were the guests of the juniors at the Junior-Senior Prom Saturday, June 1, from 8:30 to 12 in the gym.

Southern Serenaders, well-known swing band from Petersburg, Virginia, will furnish the music for the occasion.

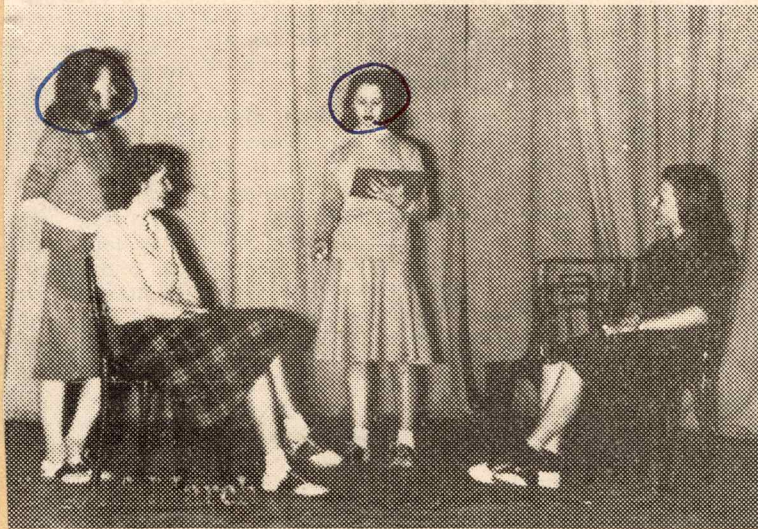

## Class of 1941 Schedules Traditional Chapel Program For Friday, May 23

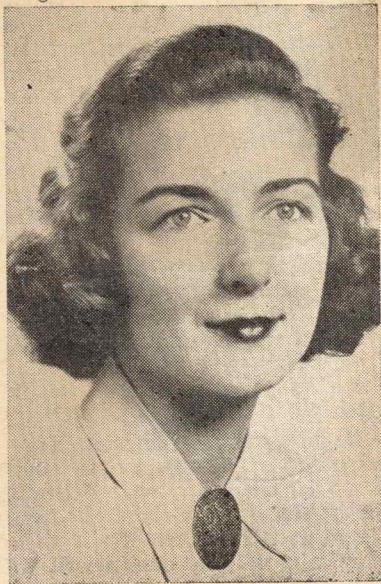

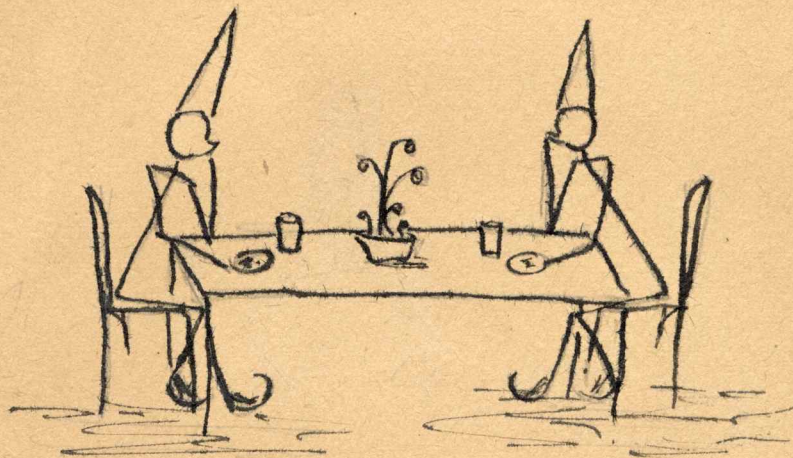

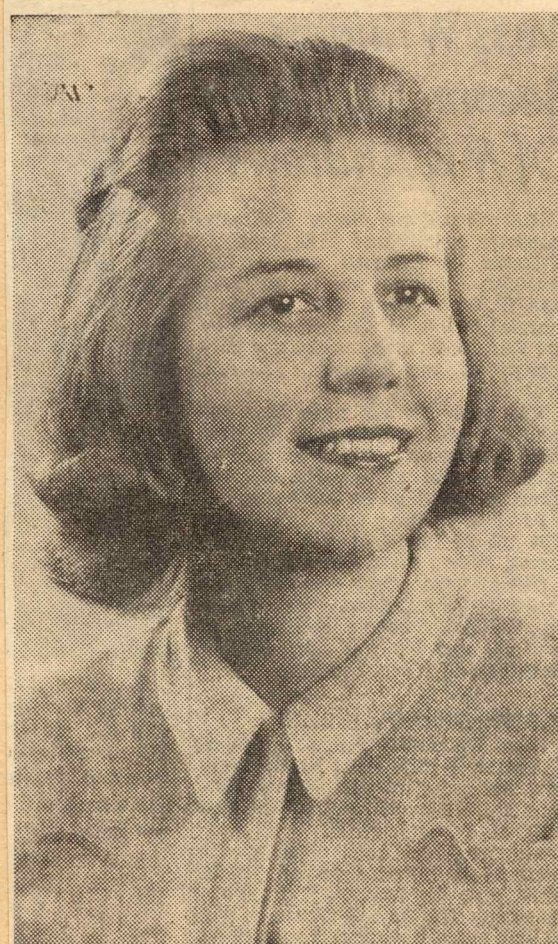

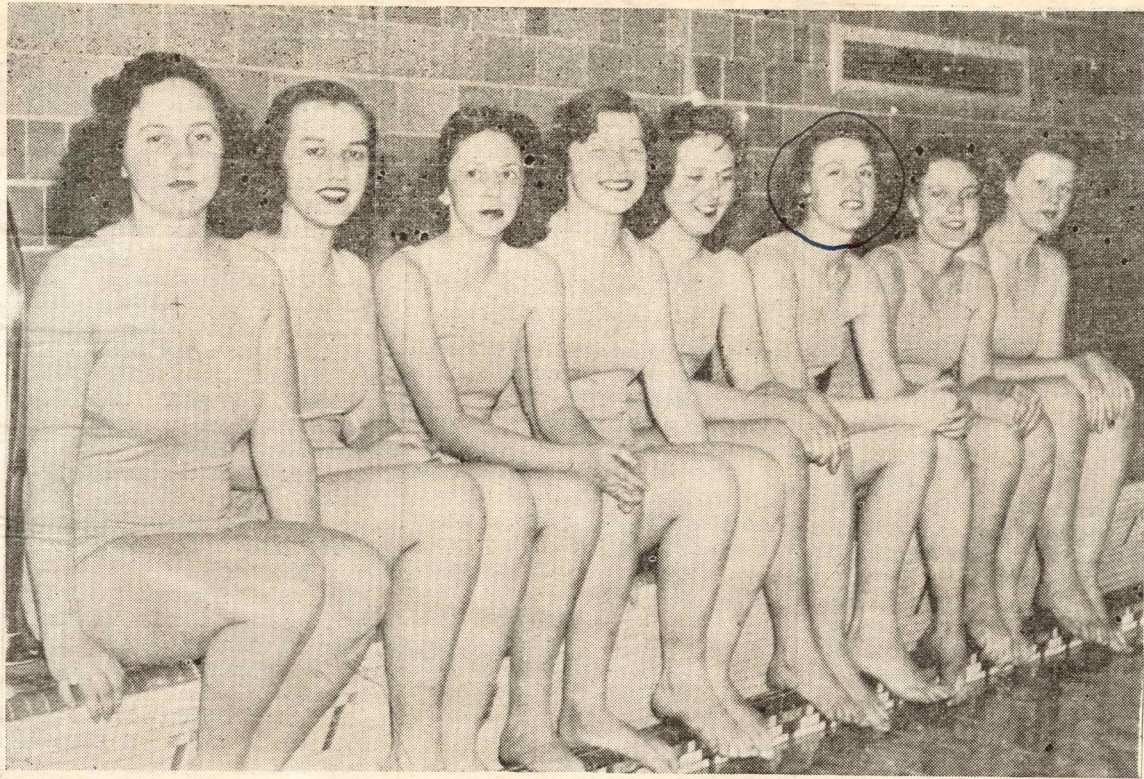

### Part of Program To Be Broadcast On Station WRNL

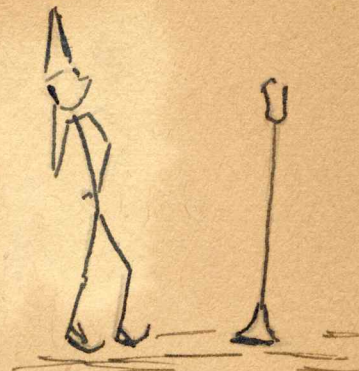

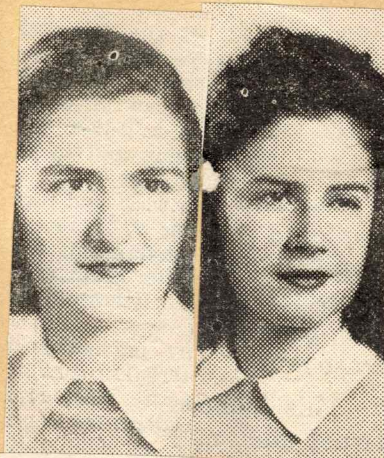

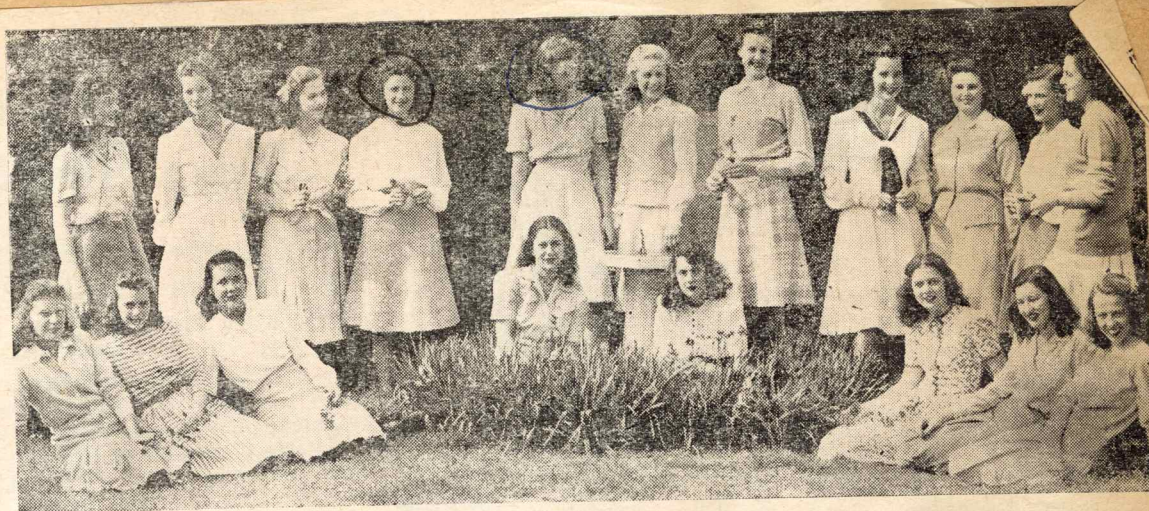

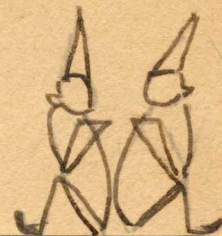
## Pi Gamma Mu Elects Delegates to State, National Conventions

AT the corner where Rose Avenue and Ninth Street meet, a leaning signpost suggests in wavering letters the names of the streets. The citizenry of the place have long since forgot the names on the sign. However, the crooked street is still choked with tenement houses and disreputable buildings hugged closely together. It has long been known as Noisy Alley.

All day long roving mobs of boys, bent on harrying susceptible victims, add to the confusion and disorder of the place. Of the lot, Crippey Binns and his pal Jeff were perhaps the queerest. 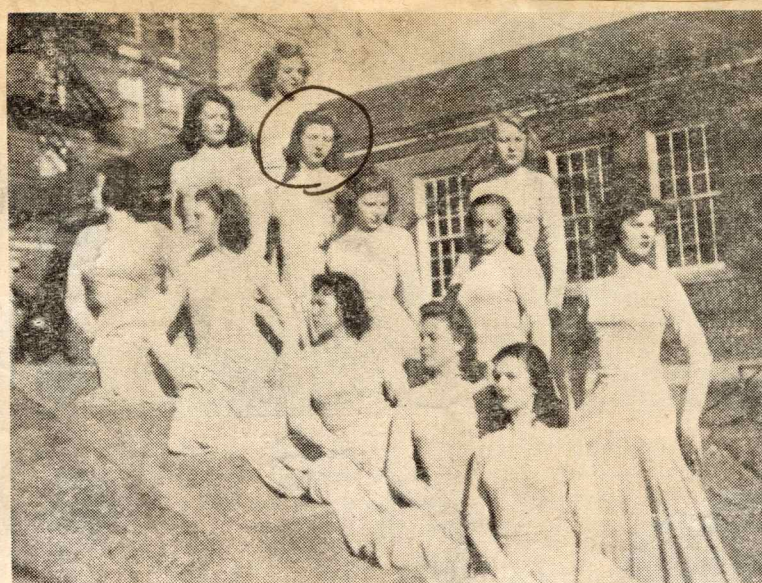
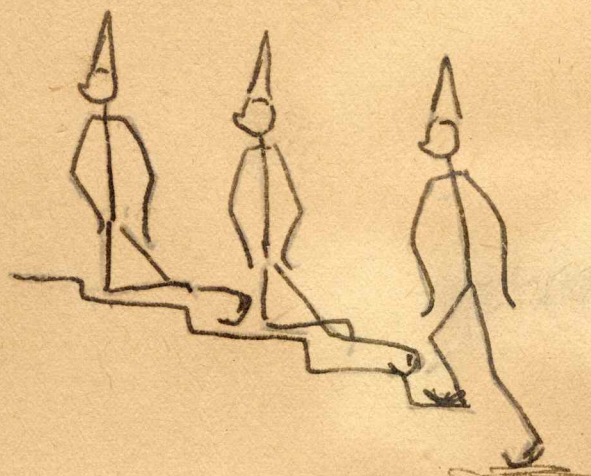


## Jean Hatton Heads French Fraternity

## This Above All

Eric Knight—Harper Brothers, 1941, \$2.50

IT is edifying in these days to find in a novel the very essence of our day. Not the cheap fiction of old soldiers' tales, but the reality of today, sorrow and hatred intermingled with joy and love. Such a novel is "This Above All", where utter honesty brings a chill and a shudder experienced in the real sordidness of war.

What, then, is the war doing to the people, the individuals who must go on living, even though their lives have been completely disrupted, their standards entirely changed.

This novel of England today describes what the people of England feel when Nazi planes are rumbling overhead, leaving destruction and heartbreak in their wake. The cold terror that brings hysteria to the calm, cowardice to the brave. It shows that war is no longer glorious. War now means ruin, not only of material wealth but also of lives and hearts. Weariness and squalor, horrors that in later years will bring nightmares are not glorious; they spell ruin for thousands of lives.

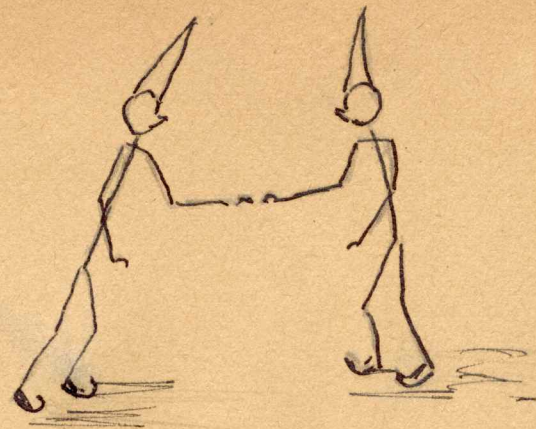
The effect of war on people in every walk of life is seen in this novel. The utter futility of war is brought out strikingly—the economic futility as well as social futility. For what are people giving up their lives, their progress, their ideals, their freedom, their very souls? For nothing but the worst hell ever known on earth.

The story itself concerns a soldier on leave and a girl from the upper brackets of society who had joined the W. A. R. F. Excellent character sketches of various members of the girl's family with their problems caused by the war appear throughout the book. Clive, the outstanding character, is one of the better developed characterizations of modern literature. Having risen from very poor circumstances, Clive had educated himself and was well on the way to success and overcoming the bitterness and futility of his earlier years when the war deprived him of life. The development of his ideas and attitudes alone makes the book worth while.

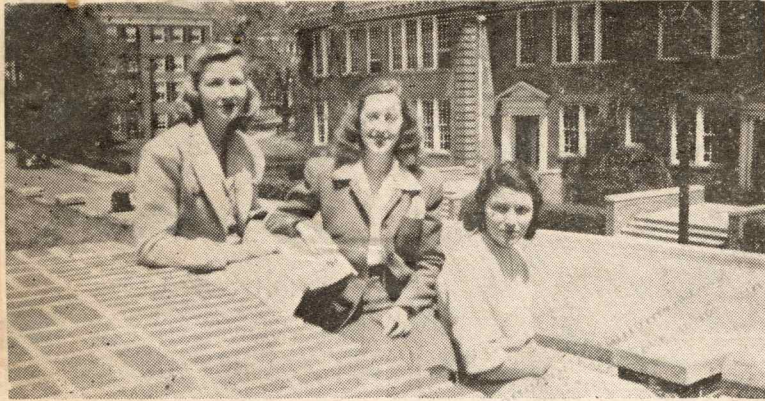

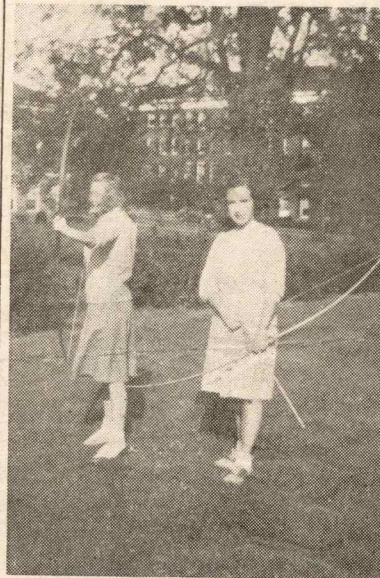
Each of these colleges will enter two groups in the contest, a beginners class and an advanced class. In each group teams will consist of six members. Any number of teams may be organized.

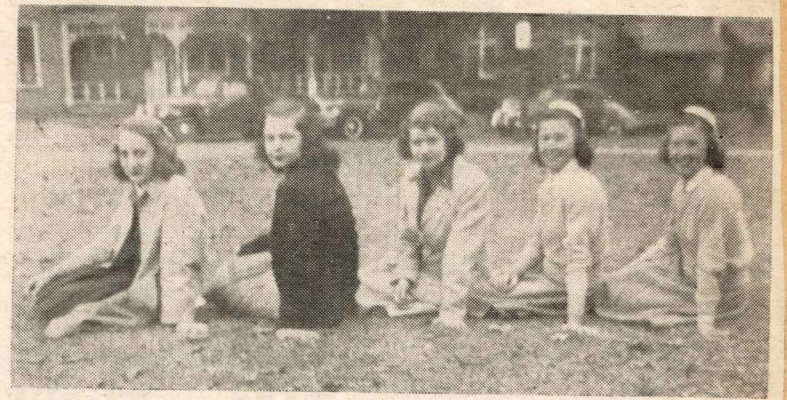

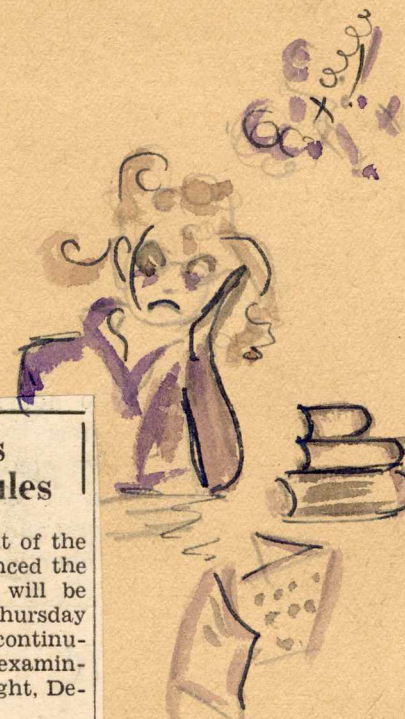

Anyone who receives a call down during this period will be subject to one week on campus.







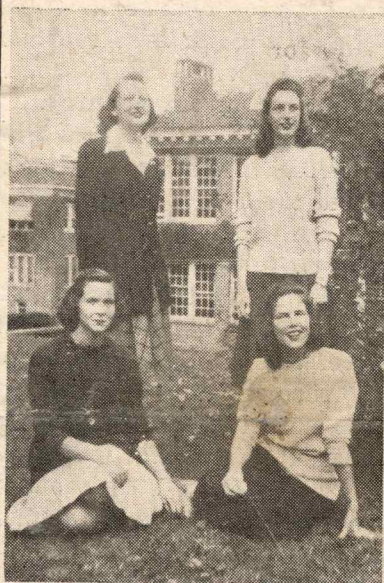



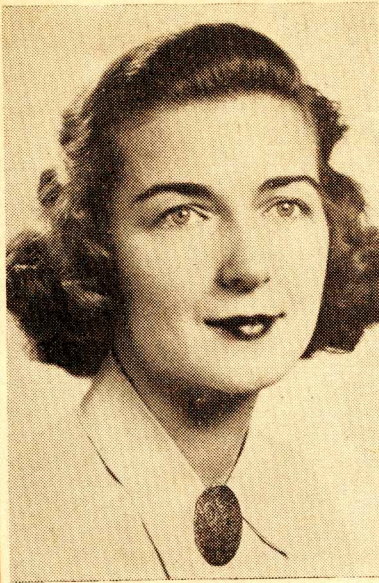
## Cline, Whelchel Will Represent Farmville At Alabama Meeting

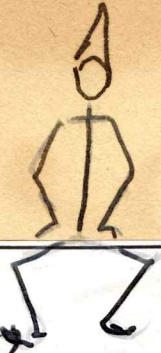
Betty Peerman, a sophomore from Danville, will edit S. T. C.'s 1941-1942 handbook.

Following a short wedding trip, Lieutenant and Mrs. Howe will reside at Camp Sheridan near Chicago.

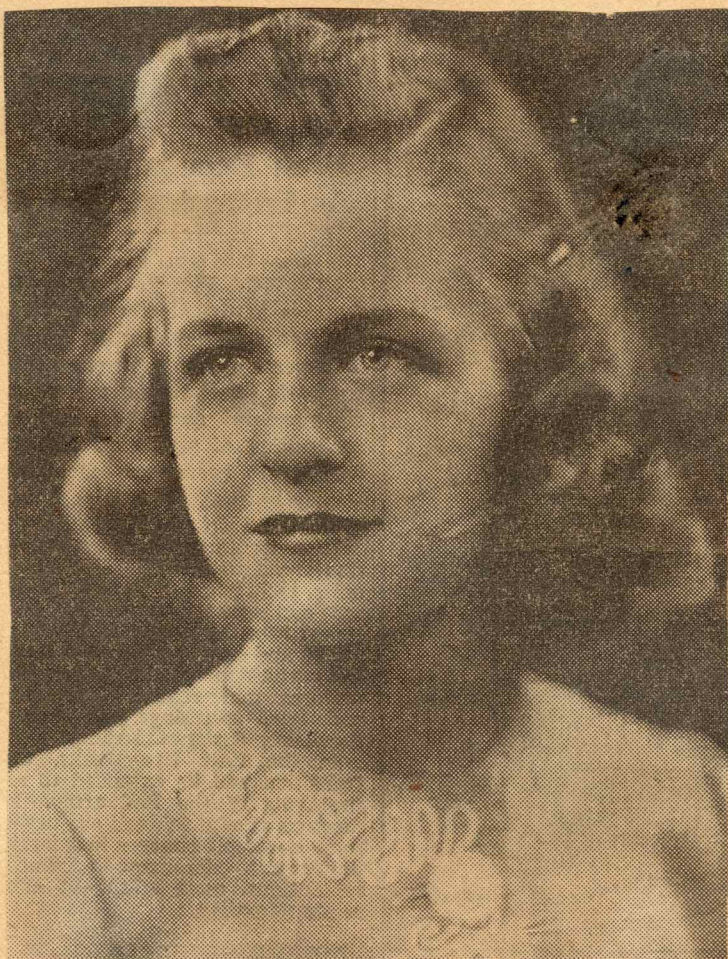

Instead of the annual class production the juniors will sponsor a dance on Friday night, January 22, 1943. Part of the proceeds from this dance will go to the U. S. O.

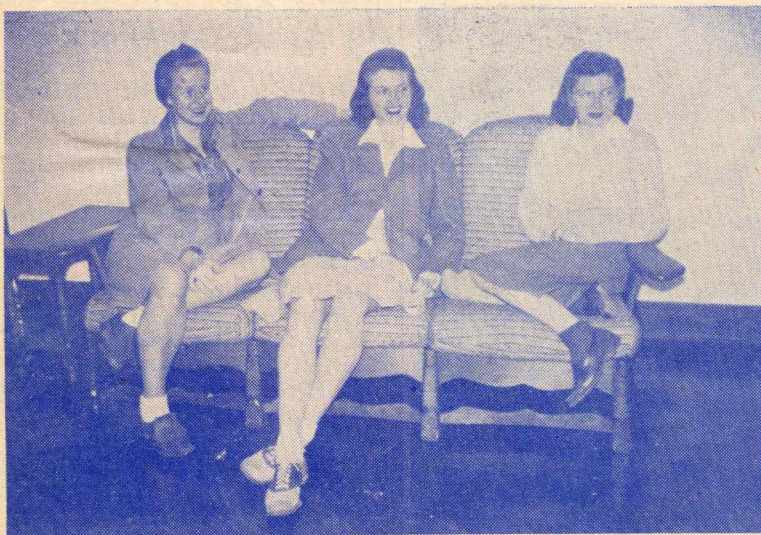

We may not be able to do great things, but we can all be more friendly to those with whom we come in contact in our everyday living. We can be always ready to help our neighbors with a smile, a cheery word, or a kind deed. We can forget our petty prejudices and treat others as we expect and wish to be treated. By overcoming the unfriendliness in our daily lives, we can help make a better world for tomorrow, spiritually stronger so that present conditions will not exist again.
