Farmville, Va., July 24 1876

My Dear E. L. do

Having a few spare moments this morning, have concluded to write a short note. Ma has just handed me a letter to direct to you & as she has written is useless for me to attempt any thing new. This morning is really cool, doubt I suppose you have had any day more pleasant in the mountains, I have been staying at home very closely since you left. William Armistead has been my companion & so far a very faithful one. Laura left Saturday to see her mother, but returned again Sunday evening. Mary Pinner has been sick ever since you left. Complaining of her head & back. The gardens have been perfectly destroyed. No vegetables at all. Little Joe Dally McHenry was very sick last night, but better to day. Christina McHenry has stiff fever. Was at church Sunday morning. Mr Edwards preached & the best sermon I ever heard from him. Miss Mattie Paulett was accompanied by her Mrs Beaux from Petersburg

Mr & Mrs Oakes. Emma says he is not now
for good. Every thing dull & dry no rain
since your letter, give my love to your Father & Ma
Kin our dear little boy write as often as you can,
I am so much behind with my letters I can write
often. We are shipping a great deal of wheat.
