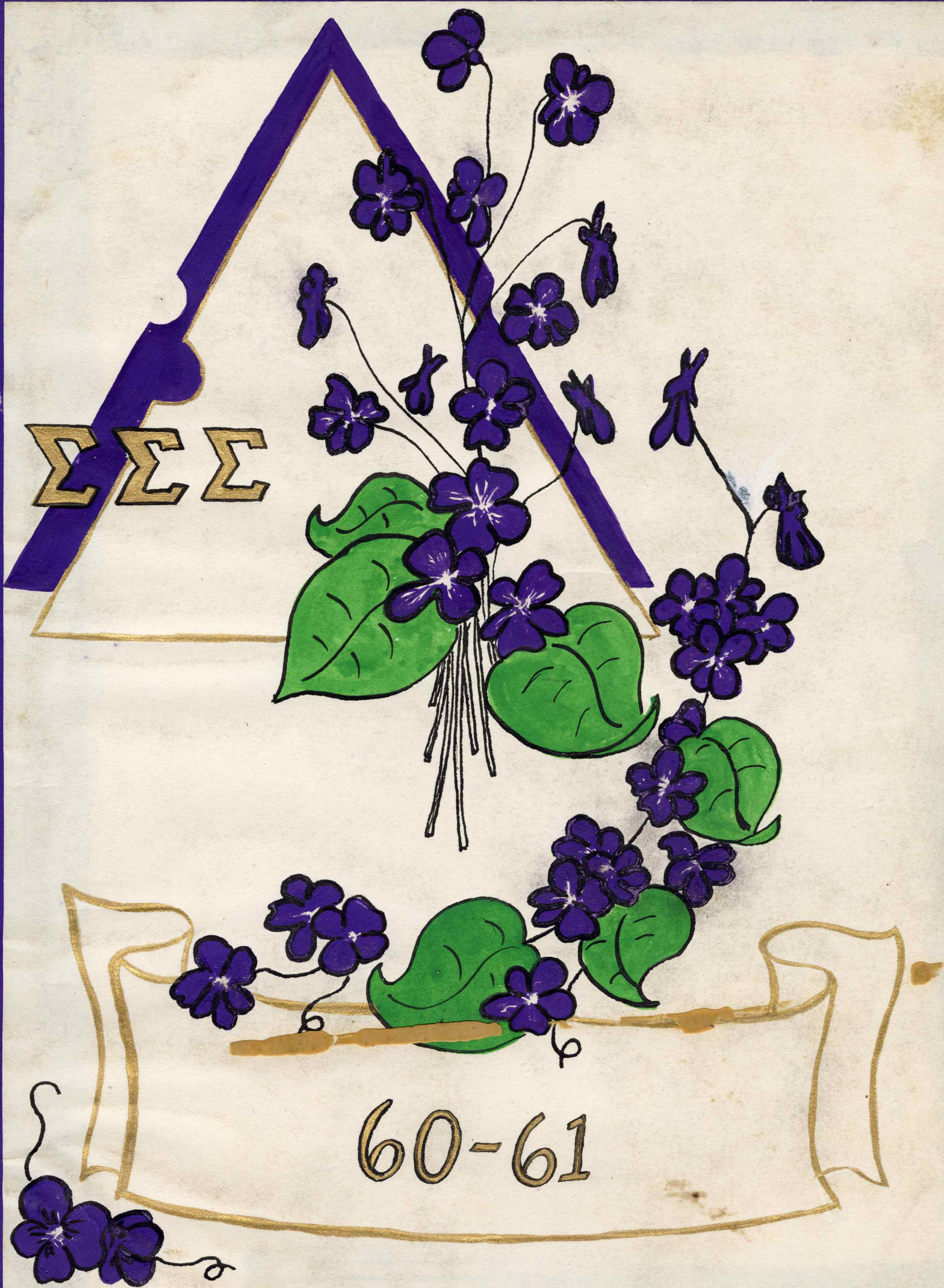

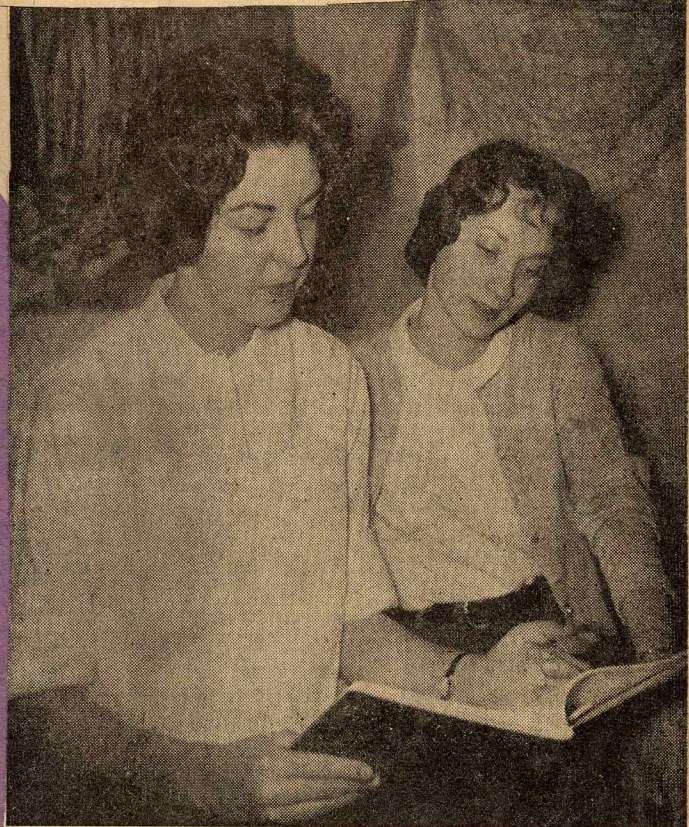

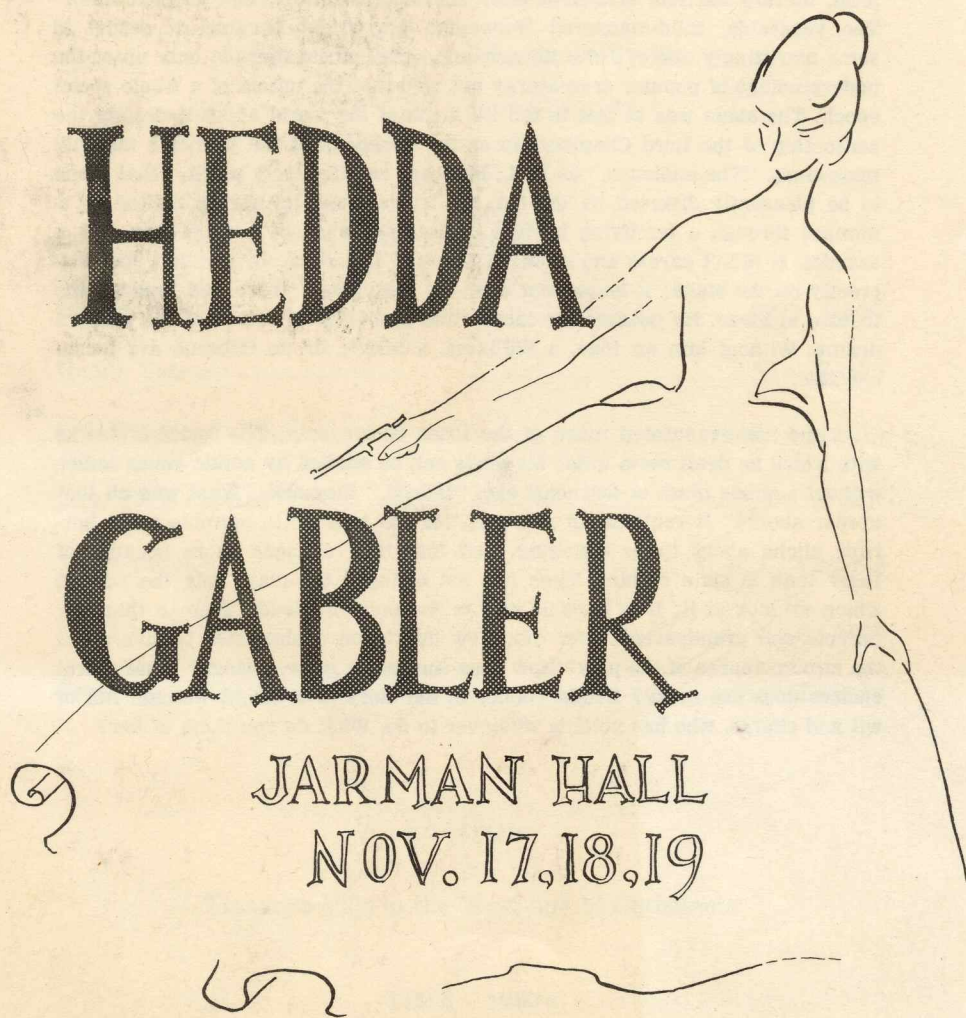

Jerry Goode, from Blackstone, appeared in the spring play last year, and plays George Tesman, Hedda's husband.

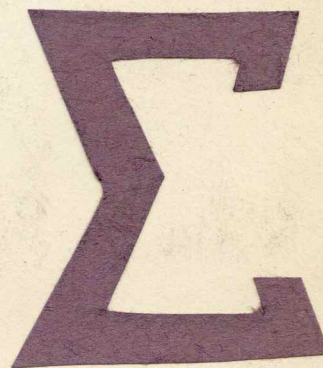

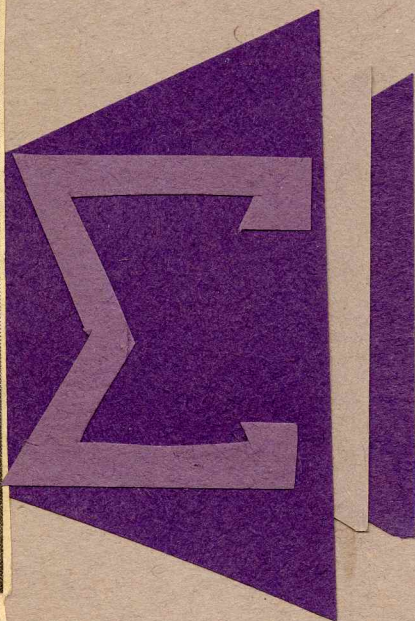

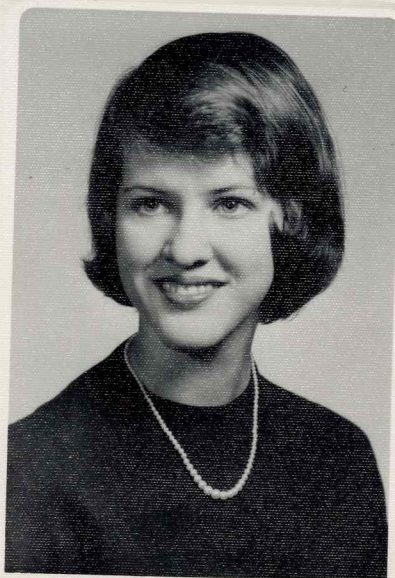

A MEMORIAL TO ROBBIE

"This is the story of a little boy's first and last day at school. All wrapped up in the heartcrushing sharpness of sudden death, it was, to start with. Now it is becoming a story of unfolding love and dedication.

"Robbie Page, only son of Mary Hastings Holloway Page, national president of $\Sigma \Sigma \Sigma$, looked forward to that first day of kindergarten with the eagerness and anticipation which was so much a part of his nature. He was so proud to be going to "the big school" at last, at the age of five and one-half, that he forgot about instructions and walked home all by himself instead of waiting for his mother to pick him up with the car. Anxiously his mother searched the streets for him and finally, much to her relief, found him running along the sidewalk toward home. Her relief was premature, however. Although Robbie escaped accident on his homeward journey that mid-September day, the very next morning he woke up with what the doctors later described as 'an overwhelming case of bulbar polio.' The following four days and nights were filled with desperation, false hopes, devout prayers and last minute attempts to save his little life from the mysterious polio virus. All efforts of science failed and on that September Saturday evening, Robbie Page died in an iron lung.

"Mr. and Mrs. Robertson Page quietly went home that night, suppressing their grief, asking for divine guidance, and resolving that for the rest of their lives they would strive to be worthy of the little boy who had graced their home.

"The next day, before funeral arrangements were completed, Robbie's parents knew what they wanted to do. Out of their sorrow and heartache was born an idea—the Robbie Page Memorial Fund to find out more about polio—what causes it, but even more important, what can prevent it.

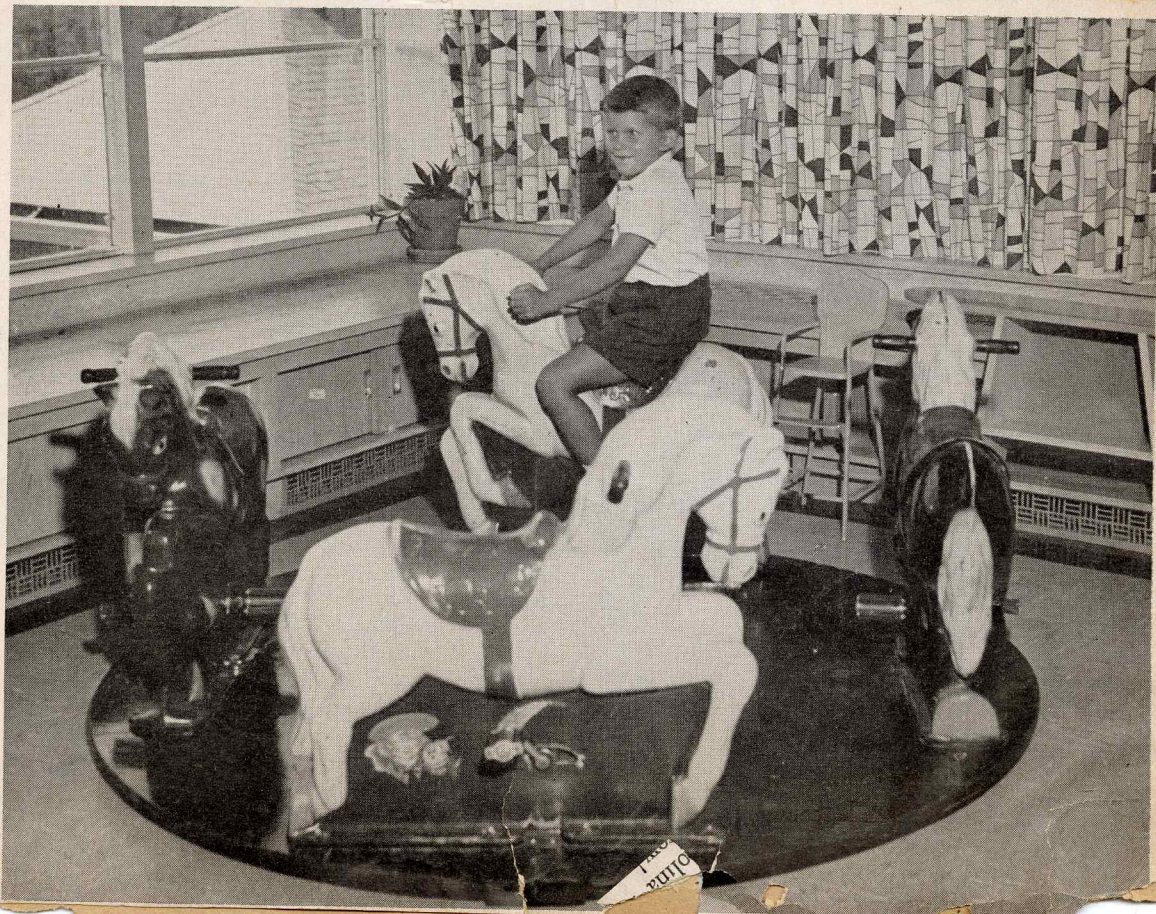

With Shaw's 'Arms'

Wellard Drama To Interchange With GB Shaw

Opening tonight is the first play in the Longwood Players' repertory production, "Arms and the Man," by George Bernard Shaw. The plays will run on alternate nights through Saturday, with James Wellard's "The Man Who Died Laughing" beginning tomorrow night.

"Comedy of Manners"

"Arms and the Man" was written in 1894, and became Shaw's first successful venture in the literary or dramatic field. He called it a "comedy of manners," intending to "poke fun at romantic or idealized concepts of warfare and love." He reveals romanticism as "sham and pretense" by comparing romanticism with realism. The play includes some moral conclusions, but is concerned mainly with producing comedy, based on the moral concepts.

"Arms and the Man" is more widely known under the title, "The Chocolate Soldier," a musical version adapted by Oscar Straus.

Modern Setting

Thursday night's production is a mystery comedy set in modern times, revolving around a theme concerning relatives who try to settle an inheritance upon themselves. The play, itself, is not heavy or classical in tone. As Wellard comments, "My purpose was to write a piece of entertaining theatre. It has no message or moral as in a serious drama; it strives simply to provide an evening of light, gay entertainment."

"The Man Who Died Laughing" is Wellard's first three-act production. His first attempt at playwriting produced "The Electronic Triangle," a one-act presented at Longwood several years ago.

The VMI cadets will participate in an opening dance sequence with the May Court in addition to their past role as escorts.

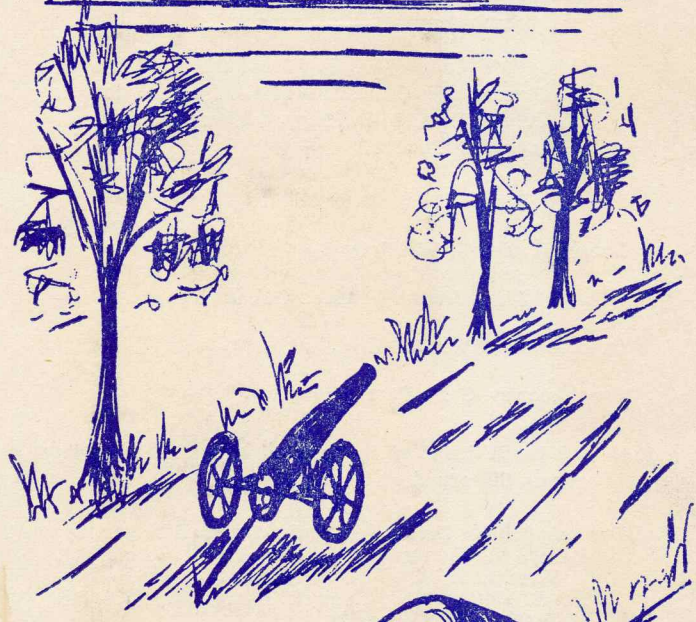

MacKenzie To Reign As May Day Queen

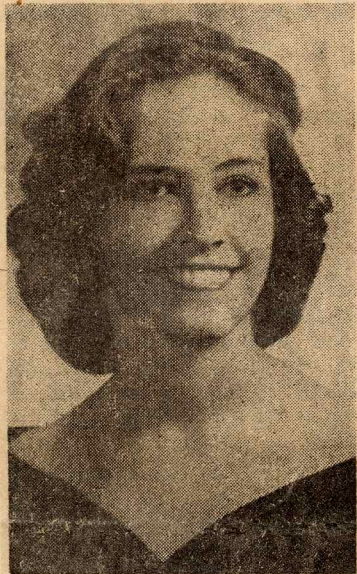

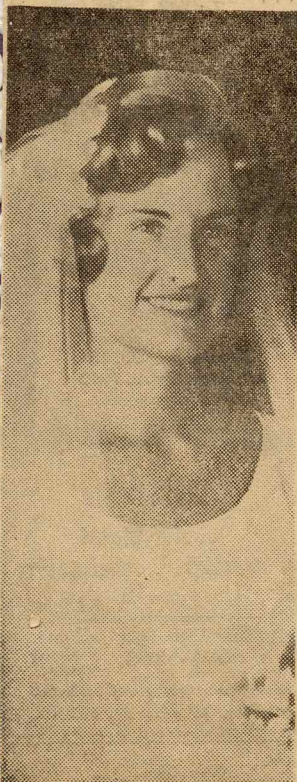
