Longwood offers courses both on the main campus and at educational sites in other locations. As a state-assisted institution of higher education, Longwood College is committed to the principles of equal opportunity and affirmative action.

The primary educational objective of Longwood College is to provide a baccalaurente and graduate degree curriculum distinguished by academic excellence. Essential to the goal of academic excellence is a faculty committed to the highest standards of teaching and research and/or creative arts.
