"Railroads and the Civil War"

This month's program is "Railroads and the Civil War" and will be presented by Howard Gregory of Appomattox. Gregory, a retired Virginia State Police Division

commander and a past president of the Civil War Round Table, has authored the history of the "38th Virginia Infanty: and the "53rd Virginia Infantry" in addition to "The History of the Wreck of the Old 97."

The "Civil War Railroads" program will address the impact and influence that railroads had on the conduct of the War in both the North and the South, as well as the challenges and conflicts experienced by both the military and the railroaders. Gregory noted that: "The bloody conflict that swept the United States in 1861 has been known by many names, including the War of the Rebellion, the War Between the States, the Late Unpleasantness, and the generally accepted Civil War. Due to the vital part played by the railroads of both the North and the South, it could also be called the Great Railroad War." The Civil War was the first major military action in which railroads played a critically important role and often the commanders were slow to comprehend the potential uses of this comparatively new mode of transportation. Special emphasis will be placed on the role of the local railroads during the waning days of the War, including the "lost Confederate gold!"

2-03-1775 Presbytery appoints Samuel Stanhope Smith rector of the new college, Hampden-Sydney

2-03-1803 Gen. Joseph Eggleston Johnston (USA and CSA) born at Longwood plantation
