

Mama, I Am Yet Still Alive A Composite Diary of 1863 in the Confederacy

Civil War studies normally focus on military battles, campaigns, generals and politicians, with the common Confederate soldiers and Southern civilians receiving only token mention. Using personal accounts from more than two hundred forty soldiers, farmers, clerks, nurses, sailors, farm girls, merchants, surgeons, chaplains and wives, author Jeff Toalson has created a compilation that is remarkable in its simplicity and stunning in its scope.



These soldiers and civilians wrote remarkable letters and kept astonishing diaries and journals. Their correspondence is written "in the moment" and is intimate, personal and very revealing. They discuss disease, slavery, inflation, religion, desertion, blockade running, and their never-ending hope that the war would end before their loved ones died. A major portion of these documents were unpublished and were made available by the Brewer Library of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

With this, his third significant contribution to Civil War literature, Jeff Toalson joins the select company of Thomas W. Cutrer and Bell I. Wiley as historians who have devoted their body of work to preserving the "voices" of common Confederate soldiers and civilians.

During this program, you will take a journey through 1863 as Toalson reads selected letters from farm wives, privates, doctors, ministers, sergeants, clerks, refugees and nurses. He will complement his presentation with a variety of historical artifacts and perhaps share some "wisdom" from *Mackenzie's Five Thousand Receipts in all the Useful & Domestic Arts* including suggested cures for dysentery and other ailments.

This Day in March in Prince Edward County History

- **3-1-1841** Blanche Kelso Bruce, first black U.S. Senator (elected from Mississippi), born in Farmville
- 3-1-1899 Gov. P.W. McKinney died at his home in Farmville
- **3-1-1917** Farmville Guard returned from Mexican Expedition.
- 3-1-1943 World War II canned goods rationing began
- **3-2-1942** World War II defense training classes begin for Prince Edward citizens
- 3-2-1964 Prince Edward Hotel collapses while under renovation
- **3-3-1884** Farmville and Powhatan Railroad chartered (narrow-gauge line to James River)
- **3-4-1903** Tobacco factory known as "Dunlop's" burned, half million pounds of tobacco lost
- 3-4-1913 Farmville Guard marches at Woodrow Wilson's Inaugural
- **3-4-1949** East wing of State Teachers College burned, displacing 46 students
- **3-5-1839** Farmville Female Seminary established by local supporters (official birth date of Longwood University)
- 3-5-1846 The South Side Rail Road chartered
- **3-6-1935** Birth of Barbara Johns, organizer of 1951 student strike at Moton School
- **3-7-1884** Virginia General Assembly passes law establishing State Female Normal School to train teachers at the alreadyexisting "female seminary"
- **3-7-1886** State Female Normal School incorporated
- **3-7-1921** J.B. Wall purchased *The Farmville Herald*
- 3-8-1938 Farmville Rotary Club organized
- **3-10-1816** Judith Randolph, Farmville's "matriarch" died in Richmond, far from Bizarre plantation
