The Farmville and Powhatan Railroad

Bob Flippen is the speaker at the July 21 meeting of the Farmville-Prince Edward Historical Society. Bob is the Educational Specialist for High Bridge State Park. In addition to this, he is a historian, an author, and Vice President of this historical society. He is a graduate of Cumberland High School and received a BA degree in Anthropology with a minor in Political Science from George Washington University.

The Farmville and Powhatan Railroad was chartered in 1884 and completed in 1890. It ran from Bermuda Hundred to Farmville and mainly served Cumberland, Powhatan and Chesterfield Counties. The Farmville and Powhatan Railroad's depot and turntable was located near the site of "Buffalo Shook". It was in operation until 1905 when it was reorganized and renamed the Tidewater and Western Railroad. The Tidewater and Western Railroad closed in 1917 and the tracks

were sold to the U.S. government for use in France during World War I. At the meeting, Bob will disclose other fascinating facts about this railroad.
