Body art is all the rage

After 15 not-too-painful minutes in the tattoo parlor, Virginia Tech University freshman Nicole Popovich pulled up her jeans, plunked down \$40 and walked out with a tiny Japanese symbol of courage etched on her hip.

"It was my last rebellious act," she said.

Popovich, like many college students of the '90's, is into body art. The trend means bare bodies are out. Bodies that are decorated, stamped, stenciled, tattooed or pierced are in.

"They're addictive," Popovich said of her black tattoo, which she could buy cheaper than a colored one.

"Once you get one — it's such art, it's an art form — you want more."

The communications major, who noted that she wouldn't dream of piercing any part of her body, has carefully planned her next tattoo.

"I was thinking about getting one on the inside of my ankle. You know, more on my foot. Maybe the sun with a yin-yang in the middle," she said, adding that a good friend also wants the same symbol tattooed on her foot.

Has Popovich shared her secret with her parents?

"No way. But I haven't regretted," she said of her decision to tattoo. "The symbol means something to me. I wanted something to remind me of what is important."

The practice of pricking the third layer of skin and filling the scratches with indelible ink has its beginnings in Polynesia. Once a counterculture status symbol in this country, it's now hit the middle class. The more recent trend has its roots in the entertainment industry; many pop culture idols now proudly display tattoos that once would have been treated with disdain by middle-class college students.

Some high-profile tattoos: Cher's black-lace-patterned bottom which made the tabloids, Roseanne and Tom Arnold's matching hearts, Robert De Niro's chestful of fire-and-brimstone symbols in "Cape Fear," and more rock stars than you can shake a needle at.

Even in the conservative Midwest,

the hippest, hottest thing to do is show off a tattoo. At Iowa State University, members of the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity recently flaunted matching ankle tattoos — Greek letter, of course — in a photograph in the Iowa State Daily.

Tattoo artist Chris Ryder works at Lace and Leather, a tattoo and body piercing business in Tucson, Ariz., where droves of University of Arizona students come to get poked, pierced and scratched in the name of beauty.

"Younger people like the newer styles in tattoos," Ryder said. "It's more of an art, lots of fine line detail, great color, things look more real."

Ryder said that older style tattoos used bold lines and poor color, and would fade through the years. Now students bring pictures in that are meticulously traced, and through a transfer process, copied onto their skin.

For a cool \$90-per hour fee, Ryder will fill a student's entire back with an elaborate tattoo that may take up to 18 hours to complete. However, most student tattoos are more conservative: Greek letter discreetly placed on an

their noses at people with tattoos.

Patrick Tien, a sophomore at George Mason University in Fairfax, Va., said his tattoo of Calvin, of the Calvin and Hobbes comic strip is an expression of his inner self.

"I think it's kind of me, you know, the carefree me," he mused. "But if my parents see it they will say, 'Leave the house immediately.'"

"The worst part is they had to shave my leg," he said, recalling the experience of being tattooed. "It cost \$45, is black, and I'm working on getting it colored in."

Tien said the trend is growing so much that even conservative students are giving into the charms of body art.

"This extremely clean-cut student — never done anything bad — just had a tequila worm with a little hat on tattooed to her breast. I assume she was sober," he said, noting that nose piercing is also hot on his campus.

Tattoo experts warn students to use established tattoo parlors, and make sure the artist wears gloves and changes needles from customer to customer, sterilizing needles as they go.

And if you change your mind? There are some chemical that will break up the color on the skin, and laser surgery, not yet approved by the FDA, an expensive process that will shatter the color pigment through 100 million watts of electricity and will still leave a mark.

While being tattooed may require only a dose of patience, body piercing is not for the fainthearted, said Sondra Jones, the body piercer at Lace and Leather, who sticks needles into brave stu-

ankle, or a tiny heart on a breast.

Most students pay \$35 to \$45 for a one-color tattoo about the size of a fifty-cent piece, but the price climbs with each additional color. The more unusual the color, the more the tattoo will cost.

"Custom pieces are a challenge. I try to pick it out of their brain and put it on their skin," Ryder said, noting that in Arizona, you have to be 18 years of age to be tattooed or have your body pierced.

Ryder draws the line with certain types of tattoos.

"When it's a kid, and they want something satanic, I try to talk them out of it," said Ryder, who won't etch racial symbols on anyone either.

"No one should be judged by their skin, before or after they're born," he said, referring to folks who look down

dents who desire a ring, a stud, or a post in an unlikely spot.

"It's trendy right now, very trendy," Jones said. "People are getting back to their cultures. That has a lot to do with it."

"I've seen tremendous growth. People have this done because it is different and unique. They do it for attention, for a personality change. In the gay community, it's a bonding thing."

Jones is no longer surprised about where people want to be pierced. She has done piercings nearly everywhere on the human body, including the inside of the mouth, the tongue, breasts and genitals.

"Still, a tongue piercing is absolutely the weirdest thing I've done personally," she said, noting that all

Tri-Sigma visits hospital

The Alpha Chapter of Sigma Sigma Sigma packed up their cars and headed to the Chapel Hill Memorial Hospital in Chapel Hill, North Carolina on November 21, 1992.

Since 1951, Tri-Sigma collegians and alumnae have made contributions to the Robbie Page Memorial Foundation (RPM). This foundation was established following the death of Robbie Page, son of Mary Hastings Holloway Page, National President of the sorority at the time. Her son died from polio and at first the money raised was used to aid in the discovery of a

cure for polio, but once this was accomplished Tri-Sigma continued to support the foundation as it funded therapy for hospitalized children.

The hospital is one that has seen significant results due to these contributions. Using over a quarter million dollars contributed since 1956 the hospital has pioneered a rehabilitation program for seriously ill children, provided the pediatrics department with a completely equipped playroom, a library and a conference center, a new isolation area, a second playroom for the new ambulatory unit, a nursery intensive care unit, and adolescent lounge area, and it has also provided

for television access to the pediatrics ward.

While visiting the Sigmas got to actually see where all their money was going. They toured the hospital, and spoke with the pediatricians, but by a unanimous decision the favorite of all was playing in the playroom with the children. One sister said, "I actually realize the purpose of selling all those doughnuts and candy bars and in a lot of ways it makes it seem so much better to see someone else smile." Another sister said, "I am happy I went, I realize the purpose of living for something more than just myself."

Career outlook tightens

Troy graduated second in his class from the University of Virginia school of business. He is now in Officer Candidate School in the Army. Why, would a young man of untapped business finesse enter the Army instead of a promising business career? After a year and half of searching Troy was unable to find a job.

As we all consider the present and look into the future it has become obvious that having a college degree no longer guarantees employment, as is evident in Troy's case.

The competition for jobs has increased, creating an extremely competitive work force. You now have to be better qualified, more educated, and unique from everyone else applying for the same job as you.

Two concerns that should be on all our minds is, "How do Longwood students fair in the job market", and "What is the overall projected outlook of the job market?"

Career Planning and Placement annual placement report gives hope to all of us struggling to receive a degree and enter the job market. One observation of the report is, "In spite of the recession and the 'tight' job market, the placement record of the 1991 graduates continues to be above 91%. . . 92% placement for the professional

majors, 91% for the Liberal Arts majors and 91% overall placement."

The 91% overall placement is down only 3% from 1990. Although it was a drop, considering the current economic state of our country, 3% is an extremely low number.

Those disciplines with 100% placement include: Anthropology; Management; Finance; Economics; Earth Science; History; Music; Physics; Political Science; Social Work; Special Education; Speech Pathology; and Theater.

Business Administration and Elementary Education had 92% placement. Both Physical Sciences (Earth Science, Biology, Chemistry, and Physics) and Education have a 91% placement.

The Social Sciences (Anthropology, History, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology) have a 94% placement.

Other interesting facts the report brought fourth are: Graduate school enrollment increased from 7% in 1990 to 11% in 1991; 59% of the graduates reported an annual income of over \$18,000 and 40% reported an income of over \$21,000.

The increase in graduate school enrollment reflects the fact that to be competitive today you have to reach beyond a bachelor degree to a masters degree; however there is a catch 22.

To be competitive you need a higher education and experience. We are all now faced with the pressures of college; mental, emotional and financial, and with the pressure of finding work experience in your particular field.

The placement report also says that there is plenty of opportunity in the Commonwealth of Virginia. According to the report only a small number of graduates settled out-of-state.

Another big question on many of your minds as you stay up until the wee hours of the morning cramming for an exam, "Is anything that I am learning really going to prepare for the real world?" 83% of the graduates who responded, said that their majors prepared them for the positions they are currently holding and 67% said they are employed in an area directly related to their major.

The report indicates that even though as a nation we are currently in economic dire straits, Longwood graduates fared well in their quest for employment. Fear not mighty scholars there is hope beyond the sheep skin of our endeavors.

*It should be noted that the report was prepared from 353 responses that were returned as a result of two mailings; one in November and on in February to a total of 599 graduates; including August 1990, December 1990, and May 1991 graduates.

The purpose should be to educate the student, to teach him or her that what was done was unacceptable, not to deprive the student of his or her opportunity to learn at Longwood. It's understandable that Longwood wants to earn an admirable reputation, but it needs to keep in mind that a major part of college recruitment lies with the students' word of mouth. If a Longwood student tells a prospective student that there is something wrong with or something he doesn't like about the school, that thought is more likely to affect the prospect more than what the college prints in a catalog.

When I was in freshman seminar a few years ago, I recall being told that the students were strongly in favor of the Honor Board. This is just a little note to the Honor Board and the administration, those sentiments have changed. The system is beginning to affect the college in a negative way. Save yourselves and do something about it.

Reader questions U.S. involvement in Somalia

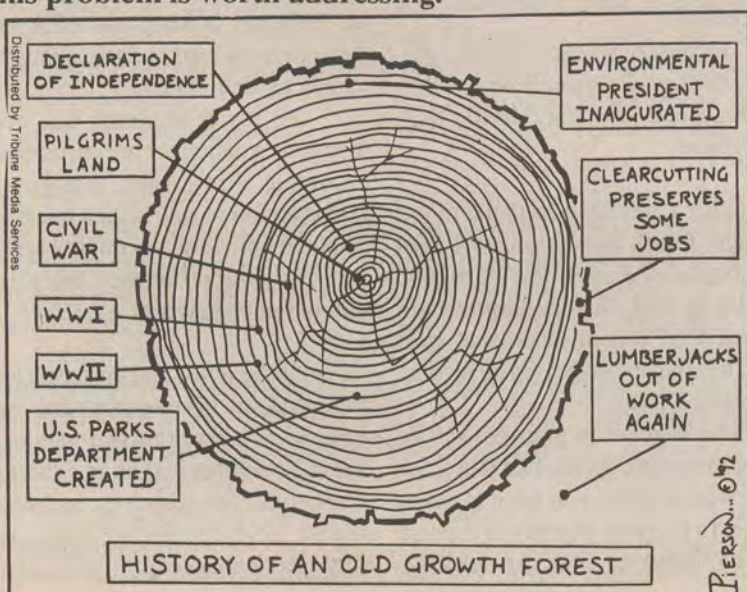
It is no wonder that for this and other reasons (such as uncontrolled birthrate) some scholars despair of

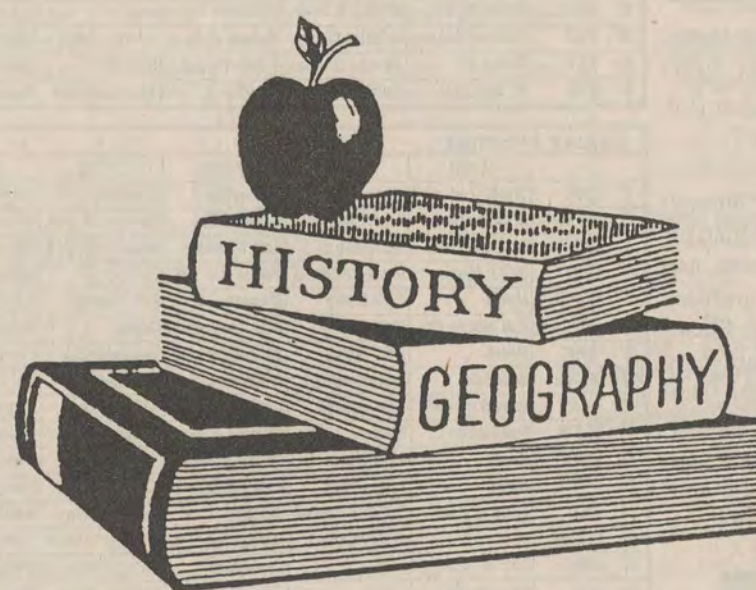

her jewelry is either 14k, surgical steel, or niobium, a treated metal that comes in colors.

"Nipple rings are common for both men and women," Jones said.

Piercing guns should be only on earlobes, Jones said, pointing out that only trained people should do piercings.

Body piercing, not including the jewelry, runs about \$10 for ears and \$20-\$25 for facial piercing.

A word of warning, piercing may not be as temporary as you think. Scars often form where the skin was pierced, and can be quite visible.

Jones noted that students used to fly to California to have piercings done, but are coming to her shop now.

The AIDS and hepatitis scares should keep people from using "street piercers" said Jones, who notes that her staff follows strict procedures to keep needles sterilized and surroundings clean.

"I wish they would regulate our business," said Jones, who said she could tell "horror stories" about poorly done piercings that have left people mutilated or numb. While tattoo and piercing businesses may be inspected by the Department of Health, most are not subject to state regulations.

Some states, however, are cracking down on tattoo and piercing parlors. In Florida, for instance, the legislature just passed a ruling that tattoo "artists" must be under the supervision of a physician, osteopathic physician or dentist. While the physical presence of the doctor is not necessary in the parlor, he or she has to provide quarterly training in the areas of infection control, sterilization and emergency procedures.

The law also says the tattooist must keep written records on clients that are subject to inspection by the Board of Medicine.

Litton, Helberg named co-players of the week

Junior women's basketball guard/forward Ana Litton, who scored 111 points in four games last week, and sophomore wrestler Mark Helberg, with two pins among six wins, have been named **co-Longwood College Players of the Week** for the period Nov. 29-Dec. 6. Player of the Week is selected by the Longwood sports information office.

Litton, 5-8, scored a career-high 35 points in a 65-57 triumph over Pembroke State last Sunday. On Tuesday in Washington, D.C., Litton notched 26 to lead the Lady Lancers to a 64-59 win over the University of the District of Columbia.

This past weekend at the Dial Soap Classic hosted by West Chester (Pa.) University, Litton scored 27 during a 101-65 loss to WCU and 23 in a 66-56

setback to Lock Haven (Pa.) University. For her efforts, Litton was selected to the Dial Soap Classic All-Tournament team.

A graduate of James Wood High School in Winchester, Litton also made the all-tourney team in the C & L/Lady Lancer Invitational Nov. 20-21. Litton is averaging 21.9 points leading the Lady Lancers to a 3-4 record this season. She adds 6.0 rebounds and has a team-high 22 steals along with 18 assists. Litton is 12-25 (48 percent) from three-point territory.

"Ana has stepped forward and raised her level of play for us," commented coach Shirley Duncan. "She's doing it all, running the break well and on the defensive end also."

Helberg was 6-0 at 177 as the

Lancer matmen went 2-4 in dual matches last weekend. He pinned opponents from William & Mary and Norfolk State, gained 15-2 and 8-2 decisions against Pembroke State and Virginia Military, and received forfeits over Chowan and Davidson.

A graduate of Osbourn Park High in Manassas, Helberg is now 11-4 this winter and ranked first in the region. He has five pins to lead Longwood, 4-6 in dual meets this year.

"Mark is off to a great start," commented coach Steve Nelson. "Last year was rough for him (fractured elbow), but he's working hard and wrestling down a class (weight) this year. We hope Mark has a shot at the NCAA Division II Nationals in March."

Longwood wrestlers 2-4 during busy weekend

Longwood's wrestling team experienced an extremely busy three days this past weekend. Dropping four of five matches on the road Friday and Saturday, the Lancers rebounded strong at home Sunday with a 45-4 thrashing of Davidson to improve their dual-meet record to 4-6.

Longwood took all but one weight class against Davidson, registering two pins, a technical fall, a major decision and three forfeits en route to the romp. At William & Mary Friday, Longwood lost 32-10 to Virginia Military Institute and 25-15 to W & M. Saturday in Norfolk, the Lancers dropped tough 32-16 and 29-23 decisions to Pembroke State and Norfolk State before downing Chowan 34-20.

Against Davidson, Freshmen Joey Hearl and Stuart Chung won 5-2 and 5-1 at 118 and 126 respectively, sophomores Ryan Stefanko and Joe Silvus 22-9 and by technical fall at 134 and 150, and junior James Mauldin and sophomore Anthony Dickens each had

pins at 158 and 167 respectively.

Sophomore Mark Helberg, freshman Jeff Smith and senior Brent Newell all won by forfeit at 177, 190, and heavyweight respectively. Freshman Mike Goff dropped an 8-0 decision at 142.

"James Mauldin, Joe Silvus, and Stuart Chung all wrestled very well for us today (Sunday)," commented coach Steve Nelson. "Friday night, we wrestled as well as we have in several years. We were very competitive, with good intensity and intelligent wrestling."

"On Saturday, we just had a mental letdown. We need to regroup now for the second semester and get some people healthy and back in the lineup again."

Helberg and Chung led Longwood's iron-man effort over the weekend. Helberg went 6-0 with two pins at 177 and is now 11-4 this winter, earning a number one ranking in

the region. Chung was 5-1, improving his record to 11-6. Chung is also ranked first in the region.

Weekend marks include Newell 3-2, junior Keith Goff 2-2, Mauldin and Stefanko both 2-3, Silvus 2-4, freshman Clay Wise 1-0, Hearl 1-1, senior Brian Jones 1-2, sophomore Nate Brown, Dickens, and Smith all 1-3, junior Tom Lewis 0-1, and Mike Goff 0-2. Brown also had a pin against Chowan, while Jones suffered torn ligaments in his right ankle against NSU.

Top records this winter for the Lancers, in addition to Helberg and Chung, belong to Jones (9-6), Keith Goff (7-6), Newell (6-5), Wise (6-6), Silvus (8-10), Brown (5-8), and Mauldin (4-7).

Longwood is off until after Christmas break, returning to the mat Jan. 7 at Liberty University in Lynchburg for a quad-match with LU, Chowan and Norwich (Conn.), beginning at 1:00pm.

Junior Cassie Ensley, currently out with knee and ankle injuries, has a 17.5 average. Ensley adds 3.3 rebounds with 15 steals and 10 assists. Dellinger's averages are 9.1 points and 10.1 rebounds, Owens' 6.6 and 8.4, and classmate Kerri Johnson 7.1 and 5.3 assists.

Following the High Point game Tuesday, Longwood is off until Jan. 9 when it hosts Lincoln Memorial (Tenn.) University at 1:00 in Lancer Hall.

Lancers fall short in effort to defend title

Parks, Wingate take Par-Bil's tourney title

Wingate center Winston Parks is listed at 6-5, 247 pounds, but the Bulldog senior played even bigger than his normal dimensions in the 10th Par-Bil's Tip-Off Tournament over the weekend in Lancer Hall.

Parks scored a tournament record 59 points in two games and led Wingate's men's basketball team to a 79-71 victory over Longwood in the title contest Saturday night. After scoring 34 points in an 81-77 win over District of Columbia Friday night, the Wingate wide-body hit 12 of 16 shots and scored 25 points against the Lancers. He also pulled off nine rebounds.

"Our biggest problem was we couldn't stop Winston Parks," said Longwood coach Ron Carr. "We tried several different things against him, but nothing worked."

Tournament Most Valuable Player

Parks, naturally, was a unanimous choice as the Par-Bil's Tournament MVP. He was joined on the all-tournament team by Wingate's Kelsey Grier, Charles Brown and J.B. Neill of Longwood, District of Columbia's Samuel Fatoki and Ron Gulley of Davis & Elkins. Parks set new tournament records for points in a game (34), points in two games (59) and field goals in two games (25). He helped Wingate move its record to 6-2 for the

season.

Longwood, which dropped to 2-3 heading into a game at Division I Marshall University Monday, beat Davis & Elkins 97-74 Friday night to reach the championship game. District of Columbia won the battle for third place 92-82 in Saturday's opener. The Lancers had their sights set on repeating as Par-Bil's champs (LC won the title last year), but it was not to be.

The Lancers had more to overcome than just Wingate and Parks. Longwood had to play the final 6:17 without scoring leader Charles (Soup) Brown, who was ejected after picking up his second technical foul of the half. Brown, who scored 21 points in the win over D & E, had 14 in the first half against Wingate as Longwood led 39-38. He failed to score, however, in the second half. One Point Lead

When Brown was tossed out (two technicals bring automatic ejection), Wingate owned just a one-point lead 60-59, after Longwood scored five points in a row. With Brown banished, the Bulldogs took a bite out of the Lancers with an 8-0 surge which gave them a 68-59 lead with 3:32 left. Longwood never got closer than six the rest of the way.

Longwood never really solved

Wingate's zone defenses and as a result hit just 41.8 percent of its shots from the floor (23-55). The Bulldogs, mainly Parks, got better shots and 50.9 percent (27-53).

J.B. Neill, who hit five of six three-point field goals for the two nights, scored 14 against Wingate, and along with point guard Michael Druitt helped keep Longwood in the game. Druitt had 10 points and eight assists. Sophomore Matt Watkins had three steals and 10 points.

In the win over Davis & Elkins, Neill had 11 points and eight rebounds, Druitt 12 points and assists, Watkins 11 points and five steals, and Chuck Laster 11 points. Freshman Benji Webb totaled 10 points and 11 rebounds in the tournament, and senior Bryan Weaver had a combined 16 points and 14 boards in two nights.

The Par-Bil's tournament was sponsored for the 10th consecutive year by Par-Bil's Food Store in Farmville. More than 1,200 fans came to watch the action.

After the visit to Marshall Monday, Longwood returns home to host Division III Averett Wednesday night at 7:30 before the exam break. Table Lancers resume play at the Lincoln Memorial Tournament Dec. 18-19.
